Councillor apologizes

STOUFFVILLE — Fred Munroe of R.R. 1, Gormley, is waging a running battle with Town Council over an application that, if approved, would permit light industrial/commercial development...

While Mr. Munroe gained no assurance the Town would not proceed, he did win an apology from Councillor Wilf Morley at a meeting July 2.

Mr. Morley said he was "very embarrassed" that Mr. Munroe and fellow delegate, Candy McGregor, Bethesda Sideroad, had been kept waiting almost 2 1/2 hours.

"I apologize," said Morley when the discussion finally resumed. "It's unfair to have kept you people waiting. I feel very embarrassed..."

The Gormley area engineer described as "a contemptible act," any decision by Council that would allow industry to locate at this site.

The Province, Mr. Munroe explained, hasn't a groundwater protection policy. This, he said,

places added responsibility on the municipality.

The complainant's remarks were supported by Mrs. McGregor, Industrial-commercial development at this 55-acre site poses a grave threat of pollution downstream, she said.

Mr. Munroe said he'd given notice of his opposition to the Ontario Municipal Board but didn't wish to spend time and money fighting Council at an O.M.B. hearing.

"Be forthright and honest and vote against it," he urged. The book publishing firm of Fitzhenry and Whiteside wishes to erect a plant on a portion of the property.

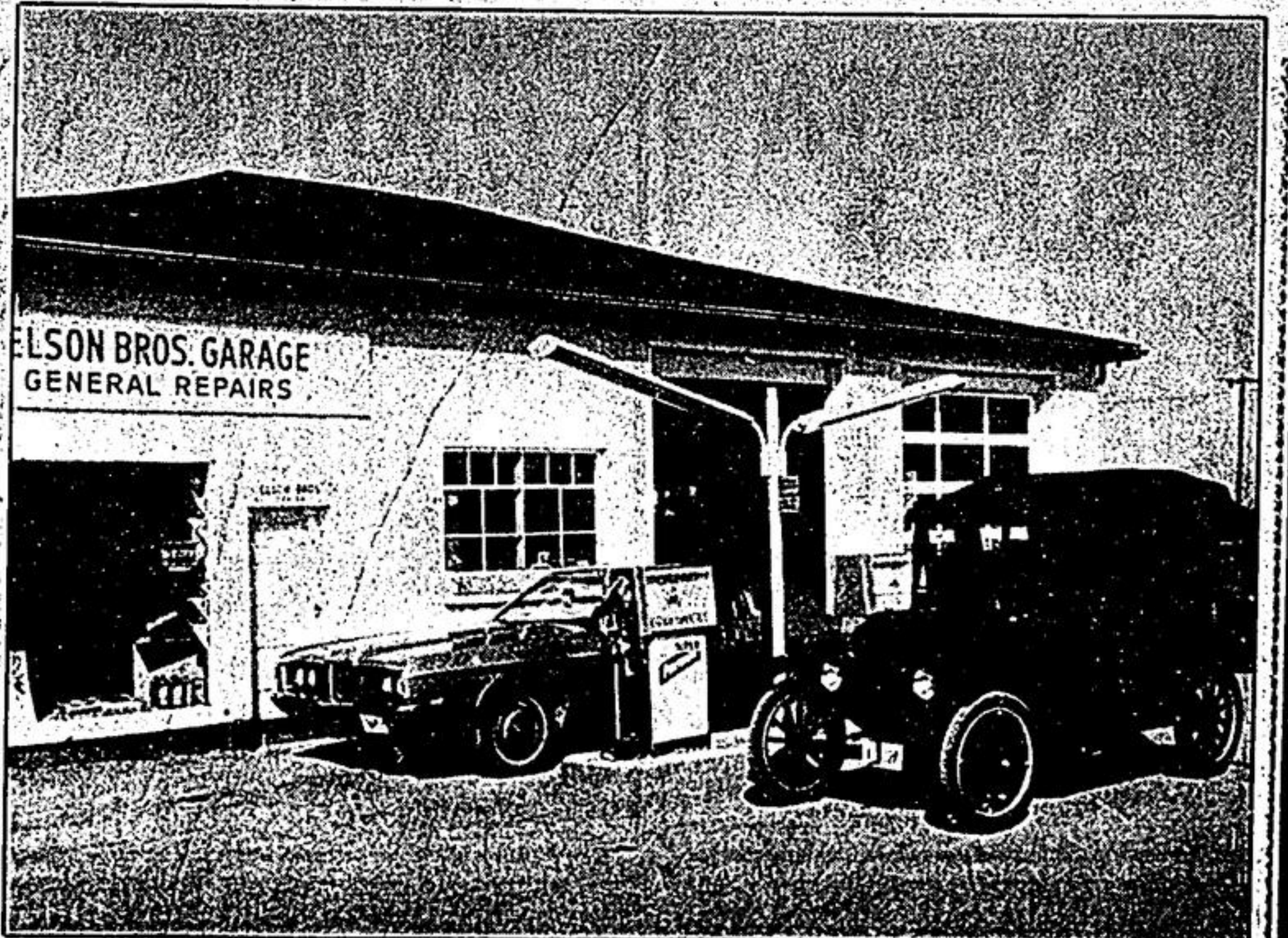
"I was very impressed by the community's participation in that everything was very well attended," said Festival Organizing Chairman Jim Heidema. "It was definitely much better than last year's."
