Although every season has its unique beauty and charm, the fall season is in a class of its own. What other season can compare to the beautiful reds, oranges, greens, browns and yellows of fall, as the hillsides come alive with the changing of the trees? There is often a crispness in the air, the smell of leaves burning, or a log fire. It's no wonder that fall is a season of Thanksgiving.

As we share in another Thanksgiving time, most of us in the Markham area have much for which to be thankful. We live in a beautiful, fairly affluent community. We live in nice homes, drive nice cars, wear beautiful clothing, eat more than we need, have all the latest conveniences right at our fingertips.

Materially speaking, we've got it made. Oh, we still complain about not having enough, of wanting so much more, but when you really stop to think about it, we really do live like kings and queens. Without a doubt, we are all enjoying a standard of living our grandparents and great grandparents would have thought only the extremely wealthy could afford. Even I as a child considered eating in a restaurant, even McDonald's, a rare treat. For my kids today, however, such outings are almost a weekly experience.
