Professional pastors come under fire

Dear Editor:

The Jimmy and Tammy Affair, like the English Guy Fawkes Day, should never be forgotten. It glowed with errors, not so much from the Jimmy and Tammy angle personally, but from Christian people who are "not so wise as the children of this world."

We have it on a smaller scale in each of our churches where, because the ball game is more agreeable than a Bible Reading, we appoint a pastor, (the younger, the better, he's more pliable), to teach us how to worship.

We don't find that Abraham's Noah had this luxury or needed this tuition. They had no inhibitions and they worshipped God as between God and Man. They worshipped God as they knew how—a real man, a real altar and a real sacrifice.

Today, we enter carpeted sanctuaries erroneously called the "House of God". But God does not dwell in temples made with hands.

We have invariably young pastors who haven't yet experienced life. They're puffed up with their BAs; their PhDs; their BSs; their DDS, etc. etc., but have proved by their actions and their speech they do not follow their divine Master.

Many of these young professionals have formed a club known as the Ministers' Association. From this Association, guidance

is provided regarding salaries, pensions, etc., much like some labor unions.

In some towns across Canada, there's a Monday morning ministers' meeting. Here, they comfort one another, crying over the fact that had they been doctors, engineers, veterinarians or paperhangers, they would have been making more money.

When, according to statistics, we only have 30 percent of the people attending church, I think it's about time spiritual men and women, as opposed to church-going folk, got together to question the weaknesses and the sicknesses of the last couple of generations. "For if the foundations be destroyed, what shall the righteous do?" (Ps. 11/3).

Having seen the error of putting one man up as leader, I think it would be appropriate to attempt a much more open approach—a testimony on what the so-called layity has done day by day during the past week!

I, as an old man and an unprofessional, have been laboring in the Stouffville area for years, working completely at my own charge by God's good grace, but never invited to give an account of God's guidance and leading.

In my opinion, this is the Ministers' Association shame, a fly in the apothecary's ointment that sends up a stinking savor.
