Cook, MacRae honored

The Markham Masters Swim Club proved it's a force to be reckoned with amongst the Town's sports groups, after two members dominated the Silver Dolphin awards.

John MacRae and Fred Cook won the awards, newly created by the Town and given out at last week's Markham Aquatic Club awards ceremony at the Markham Theatre.

Mayor Carole Bell handed out the trophies, which are to honor members of any competitive aquatic organization who set provincial, Canadian or international records.

Cook, 74, is the better-known of the pair. A longtime local resident and former real estate broker, he started swimming competitively again in 1981 after initially quitting at the age of 25.

Since then, Cook has set Ontario 50, 100, 200 and

400-metre freestyle records in the 70-74 age group, and 65-69 marks in the 50 and 100-m. freestyles.

In fact, five years ago he held the 50 and 100-m. freestyle national records as well. At the 1985 world masters games, Cook was fourth in the 50-m. freestyle and fifth in the 100-m. event.

MacRae, 40, is a four-year masters member who earned some attention at the Canadian Shortcourse Championships in Etobicoke five months back.

There, he smashed world (and therefore, Canadian & Ontario) standards in the 40-44 age group's 200-m. backstroke and individual medley competitions.

As if that's not enough, MacRae also set a new national mark in the 100-m. backstroke, and an Ontario record in the 100-m. individual medley.

BANTAM GIRLS

As with last year's set-up, the Senior Boys and Girls Leagues will be officiated by certified York Region referees under the direction of Gene Schaaf.


SPONSORS' REPORT
