It was a hard-hitting, emotional affair throughout, and Tiger quarterback Ian Witucki took a visious shot to the leg as he was going down in the first quarter.


The injury didn't take him out of the game for long, but it did hamper his running ability forcing the Tigers to use big fullback Trevor 'Bubba' Davis more than they planned.
