


# Bargain Harolds packs 'em in

St. Mark's overflow

Dear Mr. Thomas:  
Further to our informal discussion Nov. 13, I wish to add and reiterate some of these points with regard to the situation at St. Mark's School, Stouffville.

The maximum capacity at our school is 257.

The enrollment projection for 1987-88 is 370 students with six portables on site.

The enrollment projection for 1988-89 is 410 students with nine portables on site.

We are able to effectively carry out all school programs for the present. However, looking to the long term, an addition and renovations to St. Mark's would add permanent classrooms and provide expansion to the gymnasium, library and the office areas.

The Board has placed St. Mark's on the capital forecast for the 1989 school year. What now must follow is the process of applying to the Ministry of Education to make this proposal a reality.
