New flag won't fly

Markham's old town flag — its corporate seal — will continue to fly from poles at town buildings in the town.

In a close 6-5 vote Tuesday, members voted to halt plans for a redesigned flag and maintain the corporate seal in use today.

The move came after the town failed to choose any designs submitted by local residents for new flag concepts. About 30 were handed in after the contest's announcement in late summer.

But a call to promote the existing flag came with the town's vote to abandon its search for a new banner.

Unionville Councillor Fred Cox says the town should begin promoting it amongst residents and area business to boost Markham's profile both com-

mercially and residentially.

He still believes a design is needed to better identify the town of Markham to others.

And he points to other Metro area municipalities that unveiled new flags in recent years.

"We should have a flag that's more or less indicative of what this town is all about — past, present and future," Cox said.
