



On Jan. 5, Planning Advisory Committee was told yet another firm, Skelton Truck Lines Ltd., McCowan Road, Markham, had purchased 27 acres near the corner of Bethesda Sideroad and Hwy. 47. The Skelten firm wishes to vacate its rented premises. north of Hwy. 7, planners were informed.

If approval is granted, the company will erect two buildings and employ up to 40 people, spokesman Randy Alcorn of Alcorn & Associates Ltd., Thornhill, told the meeting.
