Trooper Joseph Bell killed in action

Korean soldier honored by vets

STOUFFVILLE — A delegation including four members of the Korea Veterans Association and one member of Stouffville Legion Branch 459 attended a Town Council meeting, Jan. 12. They explained that many Canadians had taken part in the Korean War and that Trooper Joseph Raymond Bell of R.R. 1, Stouffville had been one of 516 casualties.

Paul Saulnier, Public Relations Officer for the K.V.A. said between 1950 and 1953, 27,000 Canadians had enlisted for ac-

tion in Korea including Trooper Bell.

The Association requested permission to hold a Remembrance Parade and Service, June 5, the day before Trooper Bell's death in 1953. They also requested permission to install a memorial cross at the cenotaph in the Stouffville Cemetery.

Council agreed the inscription "Korea 1950-1953" be added to the memorial with the municipality covering the cost. The Legion will pay for the plaque honoring Trooper Bell.

Firehall roof to be leased

STOUFFVILLE — How can the Town use property and obtain rent revenue from that property at the same time?

The Whitechurch-Stouffville Fire Department has the answer — lease the roof!

Bell Cellular needs a place to put its tower.

For Bell, the fire hall is a perfect spot.

The tower would 120 feet high. Bell has agreed to replace the present one and pay \$650 a month for use of the roof, (and the air space above). The contract would cover five years.

Bell has agreed to assume the cost of maintenance as well.

The Fire Department will also utilize the tower for their calls. It will provide signals in the 800 to 900 megahertz range, much higher than ranges for TV and radio, so no interference is anticipated.

Accomplice ruled guilty

DURHAM REGION — A 53-year-old man, residing in North Bay, has been convicted of being an accessory after the fact in the death, five years ago of Clark Major, 52, of R.R. 1, Brooklin.

Daniel Huntingdon, was charged with manslaughter. According to evidence in Oshawa Court, he assisted in hiding the van following the incident.

It was late one night back in 1982 that Mr. Major responded to noises and later attempted halt the theft of tires from the laneway entrance to the family's Brooklin area home. When he reached for the ignition keys, the culprits sped off, dragging the victim to his death.

The case was the subject of a province-wide police investigation covering many months.
