

# Science Fair big success at Ballantrae

BALLANTRAE—Debbie and Susan are destroying the ozone layer. Joe is toying with mold, and Susan is trying to cultivate bacteria.

It might appear the 'garbage-can kids' have invaded York Region, but they're only demonstrating their ingenious projects at the Ballantrae Public School's Science Fair.

"There are high calibre projects here," said co-coordinator Shirley Weidermeyer. "A science fair exposes the child to a wide variety of scientific knowledge. It also mentally stimulates the student to explore scientific investigation."

So many students were bitten by the science bug that almost 200 youngsters decided to take part in the Fair, constructing everything from Tammy Amos' taste test, Mike Morrison's solar cell, Megan Morrison's force and inertia to Joey Sherren's jets, planes and rockets.

The science fervor didn't stop with the students. It carried over to parents in the community. They were involved in record numbers.

According to Mrs. Weidermeyer, parents were given a letter requesting their participation as judges at the event and they responded in enthusiastic fashion with 23 parents and public officials volunteering their time.

It was the judges' responsibility to evaluate each project in the categories of Life Sciences, Math and Physical Sciences, and Applied Science and Engineering. The judges based their comments on the following criteria: How much scientific thought went into

Three finalists in the divisions of primary, junior, and intermediate were chosen, with at least one student representing the school in the Area 'F' Science Fair at Aldergrove Public School March 10, with the winner of that contest going to the Regional Finals and possibly the Canadian Finals.

But the Fair's emphasis was not on winning. It was on participation, said co-coordinator Donna Friedbacher. She explained positive comments as opposed to high marks were stressed. Mrs. Friedbacher went on to say the Fair atmosphere should broaden each student's interest in all forms of science and entice them to enter the Fair again.

Ballantrae principal Jim Jeffries agreed with Mrs. Friedbacher's assessment. "I think this experience gives students the opportunity to explore, in greater depth, the importance of science. They learn to coordinate ideas and work in an independent way. As a result they can learn from each others' projects."

Mrs. Weidermeyer and Mrs. Friedbacher did a fine job in organizing the Science Fair. They deserve all the credit," Mr. Jeffries concluded.
