
The second game didn't go much better. Strong delivery by Newmarket resulted in a 15-9 pasting.

Stouffville Bantam 'Clippers' 'on the ropes' in playoffs

Frustration began to show in Peter Fitzpatrick's normally stoic face as he watched his Bantam Clippers push themselves to the brink of elimination.

Monday night's 4-3 loss to a physical team from Cobourg at the Recreation Centre puts the home team in a must-win situation against Port Perry.

A victory Wednesday would force a playdown to determine who goes to the finals against Cobourg. A tie won't benefit the Clippers.

Before the game Coach Fitzpatrick must have wondered which Bantam club would show up for the game — the hardworking, grinding Clippers or the complacent, lacklustre squad. By game's end he had his answer.

"It's the same old story," said the first-year leader. "They were too worried about not going in the corners. Once they start getting hit they're afraid."

As Coach Fitzpatrick said, it was the Stouffville team that started the game taking the body as they did in their previous round-robin games. And as in the previous contests, the Clippers forgot about the physical game after the opposition began dishing out checks of their own.

Consequently, Cobourg took advantage of their intimidated rivals and rolled to a 2-0 lead after one period.

Early in the second, Cobourg widened the gap to three goals after solid forechecking and a give-away in the Stouffville end.

The Clippers replied minutes later when one of the few aggressive hometown players Todd Balazs fought off a check and made the pass to centreman Jason Underwood who slapped it into the corner along the ice.

An altercation between Brad Blacktop of Stouffville and Paul Wilson of Cobourg seemed to breathe some life into the lethargic Clippers.

With a five-on-three advantage, Todd Balazs walked out from the opposition corner and lifted a backhander into the top of the cage, narrowing the score to 3-2.

Cobourg's insurance marker came at 12:33 of the third frame. Stouffville allowed the Cobourg defenceman to gain an opening and fire the rubber to the short-side.

An individual effort by Jason Underwood into the five hole made the contest close, but by no means as close as the score would indicate.

"We've gone over and over these plays in practice but it doesn't seem to sink in," admitted the disheartened coach. "They just don't know how to adjust to a certain style of play. They begin to revert back to the old style (no hitting).

"When guys like Jason Under-

wood and Todd Balazs stop hitting and skating, the other guys on the bench start to think it's okay not to take the man.

"We only have a few players who can really put the puck in the net. We have to play a disciplined style. Jeff Cowley and Greg

Frederick are role players. They may have trouble sometimes scoring but they're players that do their job."
