Late Gerry Logan Sudden death shocks friends

STOUFFVILLE — It was with shock and sadness that word was received Thursday of the sudden death of Gerry Logan, Baker Avenue, Stouffville.

Mr. Logan lost consciousness in the parking lot at Scarborough Centenary Hospital and never recovered despite emergency treatment by staff. He was 62.

Gerry Logan was born in Toronto, one of three in the family of Jim and Ruth Logan.

His parents moved from the city and resided on the 7th Conc. of Whitchurch. Gerry took up residence in Stouffville nine years ago.

For the past 18 years, Gerry was a driver for Canadian Tire Corporation, and before that, with Apache Transport. Through this occupation, he gained a wide circle of friends.

Six years ago, Gerry suffered a heart attack and later underwent a heart bypass operation. This proved successful. He returned to normal health.

Gerry was a familiar attendant at morning Coffee Club gatherings in The Regal Restaurant. He also enjoyed reading and walking.

Like his late father, Gerry played the drums in the Uxbridge Highland Band. The pressure of business forced him to give this up.

Gerry went to work as usual, Thursday morning. While making a call, he complained of not feeling well. Immediately following his return home, Mrs. Logan drove him back to hospital. But he never made it from the parking lot.

Besides his wife, the former Mildred Miller, Gerry leaves his mother, Mrs. Ruth Logan; two sons, Grant of Brampton and Mark at home; one daughter Carol (Mrs. Robt. Nebel) of Unionville and one sister, Delphine (Mrs. Bruce Willis) of Manilla. A brother, Eric, died when quite young.

Rev. Wayne Reed of Stouffville United Church conducted the service, Sunday, from the O'Neill Funeral Home. It was largely attended. The floral tributes were beautiful.
