Paris player gains Atoms' respect

A one man team from Paris came to town Friday night and gave an incredible display of agility and scoring prowess to earn the respect of Stouffville's Fame International Atom 'Clippers'.

Tyler Pelton had a hand in all Paris goals, scoring five and assisting on the other to give the two atom teams a 6-6 overtime draw in the first game of their best-of-five semi-final series.

"We definitely have to give him more respect," said coach Mike Jones after the game. "Our centre has to cover him."

"I think we didn't move to the puck fast enough," added defenceman Jason Reesor. "I didn't think they were quite as good as they are."

"Someone is going to be on him next game. We have to try a shut that guy down."

Throughout the 61 games the Paris squad has played this season, the nimble centremen has filled the net with 93 goals and Friday's contest showed the fans Tyler's touch around the goal.

Just a minute after the opening face-off the talented 11-year-old notched his first marker when the homeside's defence was caught pinching in the offensive zone. Tyler forced goalie Greg Sanford out of position then tucked the puck under his sprawled frame.

Despite the early setback the Clippers maintained an aggressive attack that finally paid off with about four minutes left in the frame.

With a two man advantage resulting from Paris penalties, Jason Reesor fired a shot from the point hitting the endboard and bouncing to Ryan Jefferson who banged in the puck to tie the game.

The rest of regulation time was a series of highs and lows. Stouffville would take the lead on goals by Jason Davis, John McKinnon, Jason Reesor and Ryan Burkholder, but Tyler would be equal to the task.

When Geoff Smith counted with four minutes remaining in the 10 minute overtime period, the Clippers appeared destined to overcome the Paris terror.

But only five seconds from vic-

tory and Paris pressuring, Tyler passed to Jonathon Bonney, who tapped one past Greg Sanford tying the game 6-6.


"Our other centremen was

away so he (Tyler) had to double shift," said Paris coach Doug Pelton. "These guys (Stouffville) are tough. We played twice in tournaments this year and lost both."

Despite the two wins, coach

Mike Jones wasn't overconfident.

"They've improved quite a bit since we last played them," he admitted. "We just have to play better defensively. When you score six goals, you should win."
