**Area school teacher respected by all**

STOUFFVILLE — Former students remember her with respect perhaps even more today than in the days of their youth.

While firm, Mrs. Stanley Hastings, then Jean Harvey, always had the interests of her children at heart. Thanks to this dedication, the majority of pupils made their mark.

These were the remembrances of many attending the service Saturday, held from the O'Neill Funeral Home, Stouffville. Mrs. Hastings passed away March 22 at Sunnycrest Nursing Home, Whitby. She was 95.

Born at Peterborough, one of six in the family of Mr. and Mrs. Vyvyan Harvey, Mrs. Hastings received her elementary and secondary school education there.

Her first teaching position was at Kinsale in Pickering Township. She then moved to Ringwood. Later, she was called by the board of Lemonville School to take over classes there when discipline got out of hand.

Mrs. Hastings was an extremely clever lady, also a gifted speaker. Her talents were continually in demand.

A member in the congregation of Stouffville United Church, she took a keen interest in the Women's Missionary Society. She would later serve on the Toronto Dominion Board of the United Church of Canada.

Mrs. Hastings' beautiful voice was a valuable addition to the United Church choir. She was often called on for solos.

Jean Harvey never knew her mother. Mrs. Harvey died when her daughter was only two weeks old. She was raised by Aunt Elizabeth who looked on her as 'one of her own'.

Family members cherish the memories of gatherings around the piano at their 7th Concession farmhouse, singing hymns she loved so much.

She was also handy with a needle and thread, making almost all the children's clothes. She also dressed her daughters' dolls, working into the late hours of Christmas Eve so no one would be disappointed the following morning.

"She touched many lives in many different ways," Rev. Wayne Reed of Stouffville United Church said Saturday. "Each one who knew her remembers something particular, something different, something special."

He described Mrs. Hastings' death as "a celebration." "She's passed through death," he said, "she's been greeted by her Creator."

Mrs. Hastings was an avid reader who kept abreast of current events. She felt at home discussing any topic.

Mr. Hastings predeceased his wife in 1976.

Prior to taking up residence at Sunnycrest, Mrs. Hastings suffered a fractured pelvis and was confined to Scarborough Centenary Hospital two weeks.

On the occasion of her 90th birthday, she joined in a family reunion at the home of her son and daughter-in-law, Elgin and Betty Hastings, R.R. 4, Stouffville. It was a gathering she very much enjoyed.

Others in the family include daughters Helen, (Dr. Reginald Morningstar) of Etobicoke; Maryon, (Mrs. Fred Armstrong) of Locust Hill; three grandsons, Robert Morningstar, Bryan Armstrong and Larry Armstrong; and five great-grandchildren, Sarah, Jason and Jessica Armstrong, Carolyn and Mark Armstrong.

Mrs. Hastings was predeceased by three brothers and two sisters.

Spring interment will be made at Stouffville Cemetery.

**St. James Presbyterian Church**  
St. James Presbyterian Church is holding a family breakfast Good Friday morning at 9 o'clock followed by an ecumenical worship service at Christ Church Anglican, Sunset Boulevard. The congregation of Stouffville United Church will also attend. Fellowship is at 10:30 followed by worship at 11 a.m. A combined choir will include representatives from all three churches. A Tennebrae Service is planned for 7:30 p.m. with Holy Communion. On Easter Sunday, a light breakfast will be served at 9 a.m., followed by Sunday School at 9:45. A service of praise and Holy Communion at 11 a.m. will celebrate the resurrection.

**Stouffville United Church**  
The congregation of Stouffville United Church has three celebrations planned during Easter. On Maundy Thursday, a combined service is set for Lemonville United Church at 7 p.m. with Ballan-

**Cancer campaign has \$24,300 goal in month of April**

Why does the Canadian Cancer Society need your readers?

Because this year, 94,400 new cases of cancer will be diagnosed, bringing the total number of people under medical care to 300,000 in Canada.

This year, (1988), marks the 50th anniversary of the Canadian Cancer Society.

Founded in 1938 and called the Canadian Society for the Control of Cancer, the Society's aim was to inform Canadians about cancer. In 1945, the name was changed to the Canadian Cancer Society and programs offered were expanded to include research, patient services, transportation as well as education.

Today, the Canadian Cancer Society, with the help of branches like Stouffville, assist people in dealing with the disease.

Whether it's a ride to the clinic, supplying medical dressings, educating our young people or offering emotional support to patients and their families, the Stouffville Branch is an important part of our community.

To sustain the programs offered, we rely on the generosity of the community. The donations received, assist the Society to meet its financial obligations. For instance, during 1987, the Canadian Cancer Society's expenditures on patient services totalled

\$8,667,200.00 and assisted more than 35,000 Canadians.

As part of the Society's national 1988 objective of \$36 million, the Stouffville Branch hopes to raise \$24,300.00.

During the month of April, our local volunteers will be calling on the community by means of a door-to-door campaign. The revenue raised will assure cancer patients the quality of life they deserve with the hope of curing cancer in the very near future.
