DOWNTOWN WEEK

The most remarkable urban phenomenon of the past decade is the revival of downtown Canada. From small towns to large cities, the traditional cores of many of our communities are coming back to life: buildings are being renovated, downtowns marketed, cores commercially developed, merchants organized, jobs created, and streetscapes beautified.

Inevitably, downtown is a shopping center where manifold retail activity attracts townspeople. Naturally, downtown is the decision-making center in any community. Unfailingly, downtown is the richest center for entertainment activity - for dining, arts, nightlife, special events. And nowadays interest in downtown living is on the rise, understandably.

Such headway, such vivification, has led the Ontario BIA Association, Ontario's Ministry of Municipal Affairs, and Ottawa's Heritage Canada Foundation, to join together to arrange Canada's first-ever national conference on downtown revitalization: "Downtown Coming Together" will bring together in Toronto in May delegates from coast to coast, individuals committed to making downtowns vital, alive and prosperous.

It is against this background that Markham will declare the week of May 8 - 14 "Downtown Week" to mark the phenomenon of downtown renewal:

The Honourable John Eakins, Ontario's Minister of Municipal Affairs, has endorsed this proposition by means of a "Downtown Day"; he has affirmed: a municipality can "recognize the efforts of those people who work in their community's downtown".

TOWN OF MARKHAM NOTICE OF LANeway CLOSING

Proposed By-laws to stop up and close and sell a certain laneway, north of Kirk Drive and east of Yonge Street.

TAKE NOTICE THAT the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Markham intends to pass by-laws to stop up and close and to offer for sale to the abutting property owners a certain laneway being north of Kirk Drive and east of Yonge Street further described as being east of Lots 5, 6 and 7, Registered Plan 4184.

The proposed by-laws and a copy of the Reference Plan showing the portion of the lane to be stopped up and closed may be seen in my office in the Municipal Building at 8911 Woodbine Avenue, Buttonville, Ontario, during normal business hours.

The Council of the Corporation of the Town of Markham shall hear in person or by his/her Counsel, Solicitor or agent, any person who claims that his/her lands will be prejudicially affected by the by-laws and applies to be heard at a hearing to be held on Tuesday, April 12th, 1988 in the Council Chambers of the Municipal Building at 8911 Woodbine Avenue, Buttonville, at the hour of 2:00 p.m. or as soon as possible thereafter.

Facts

TORNADO AWARENESS

Each year, an average of 25 tornadoes touch down in Ontario. Some are minor and cause little damage, others such as the central Ontario tornado in 1985, are major and cause injuries and deaths.

March 30th marks the beginning of the severe weather season in Ontario.

TORNADO TIPS

Weather Watches and Warnings

Environment Canada issues weather watches and warnings when anticipated weather poses a threat to public safety. This information is relayed to the public by radio and television.

A severe weather watch is issued up to six hours in advance to alert the general public that, for a specified portion of Ontario, there is a high potential for dangerous thunderstorm weather, which may be accompanied by a tornado.

A severe weather warning is issued to alert the public that severe thunderstorms or tornadoes are imminent in the warning area — i.e., a severe thunderstorm is in progress or expected to occur within two hours.

Tornado Safety Hints

A personal tornado awareness program should include:

- being aware of the weather, knowing the radio or television stations, which broadcast up-to-the-minute weather information
- knowing the name by which Environment Canada refers to your forecast region when they issue weather forecasts
- reviewing your plans of action

When a tornado threatens

1. Stay away from windows, doors and outside walls. Protect your head.
2. For maximum safety, go down to the basement or seek shelter under a stairway or sturdy table, or in a closet.
3. Try to reach the centre of the house or the side away from the storm.
4. Avoid buildings with large areas of unsupported roof, including arenas, barns or supermarkets. If caught in such a building, seek out the lowest floor, an inside hallway or small interior windowless room, or get under something sturdy.
5. If caught in the open, try to determine the tornado's direction of travel and move at right angles to it. If you cannot avoid the storm, find a ditch, ravine or other depression and lie flat. Do not remain in your car. Many people have been killed trying to ride out a tornado in their car.
6. If no shelter can be found, hang on to the base of a small tree or shrub.
7. Remember that damaged and weakened structures, fallen debris, downed hydro wires, and gas leaks are potential dangers after a storm has passed.
