Down three games to none, and losing the fourth, and seemingly final contest of the series, they scored with a mere nine seconds left to force the game into overtime. A week or so later, they emerged series victors, winning four in a row to oust a somewhat bewildered Cobourg squad.

Series victories over Kingston and Paris ensued, leading up to the showdown with Hespeler for all the marbles. The strategy was simple for this best of five grand finale.

Since Smitty was booked in to his posh Hawaiian hotel one week after the series was to begin, it became essential to strike early, and end the

Now coach Reesor will be the first to insist his team is not dependent on any one individual, and the overall balance of his squad became more evident as the playoffs wore on.

But solid, offensive-minded defencemen are not an item to be found in copious quantities, and the prospect of having young Geoff smothering himself with Hawaiian Tropic suntan lotion while his mates were in the trenches back home was one that had Clipper supporters more than a little concerned.

The Stouffville side blew the Hespeler pucksters out of the water, 9-3 in the opener, and there was a certain feeling of relief. However, the boys from down the 401 tightened their blades and came back to make a series of it.

The big decision was made. The Smiths would rearrange the holiday, putting it off a week, due to the enormity of the occasion. The sigh of relief could be heard as far distant as Pearson International.

The Clippers, ahead 2-1 in games after a close victory on the Friday night, bowed 5-4 Saturday, and the teams came back to Stouffville for the big one. The visitors took an early 1-0 lead.

But who other than the durable Smith would tie it up, setting the stage for a tally by Ryan Burkholder to give the Cinderella Clippers a 2-1 victory in a nail-biter that saw them play the final two minutes of the contest two men short.

Howard Burkholder, father of team captain Ryan, is like Reesor in his insistence that it takes more than a few stars to make a champion.

But Coach Reesor, despite his success as a master strategist, and his annoyance with those who would pin the lion's share of the credit for the team's fortunes on a select few, must admit that championship games are so determined by the efforts of one particular player.

For young Geoff Smith, April 19 was indeed that kind of a day.

And to coach Reesor, if I have heaped too much glory on one of your 'soldiers', please understand there comes a time in everyone's life when the spotlight inevitably focuses on an individual.

Sure, they are all deserving of equal credit, the whole team. But years from now, when you recall the championship you won on borrowed time, it just may be that the name 'Geoff Smith' will broaden your smile a little bit more.
