Late Marcus Jarvis Dairy herd his pride and joy

Service was held from Victoria Square United Church, May 9, for Marcus Jarvis, a long-time, highly respected farmer on 19th Avenue, between Concessions 4 and 5, Markham.

Mr. Jarvis passed away May 6 in Scarborough Centenary Hospital where he'd been a patient almost four weeks. He was 78.

Born at Locust Hill, the son of Herb and Pearl Jarvis, he moved with his parents to Bloomington and resided on property presently

owned by Eugene Lemon, Conc. 9, Whitechurch-Stouffville. He attended Bloomington Public School.

At age 11, his parents purchased 100 acres at Lot 30, Conc. 4. Mr. Jarvis grew up to become an extremely proficient farmer. His Ayrshire dairy herd, numbering close to 60 cows and young cattle, were his pride and joy. He exported purebred stock to many overseas countries including Cuba; also to the United States,

Mexico and Quebec.

Through membership in the Ayrshire Association, Mr. and Mrs. Jarvis enjoyed trips to Kenya, Australia and New Zealand.

Marcus and Dorothy (Hart) were married Dec. 5, 1936. They continued to reside on the 'home' farm until November, 1986 when they moved to Fred Varley Drive, Unionville.

Mr. Jarvis was a long-time member in the congregation of Victoria Square United Church. While he never served on any church boards, he was always ready and willing to lend a hand at any fund-raising functions.

He served as a director of the Stouffville Co-operative Association and was a member on the board of the Markham Historical Society.

Besides his wife, Mr. Jarvis is survived by a sister, Jean Martin of Toronto.

Rev. Douglas Whidden con-

ducted the funeral service, May 9 followed by interment at Victoria Square Cemetery.

Fall-bearers were — Mervin Wideman, Richard Frisby, Earl Empringham, Terry Hart, David Pew and Jeffrey Hall.

STOUFFVILLE — Since local government takes all the flak for the ever-increasing school tax, Councillor Margot Marshall claims the municipality should have a hand in finalizing education budgets.

Councillor Marshall was commenting on a letter written by York Region Board of Education chairman Charles Cooper related to a grant shortfall from the Ministry.

Mr. Cooper suggests that should cut-backs continue, York Region might be forced to withdraw participation in further school construction.
