90 years young



Perfect site



TOWN OF WHITCHURCH-STOUFFVILLE PUBLIC MEETING CONCERNING A PROPOSED ZONING BY-LAW AMENDMENT PARKING REQUIREMENTS/PARKING AREA REGULATIONS

NOTICE OF MEETING
TAKE NOTICE that the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville will hold a public meeting on TUESDAY, JULY 5TH, 1988 at 8.00 P.M. in the COUNCIL CHAMBERS of the MUNICIPAL BUILDING, 19 CIVIC AVENUE, STOUFFVILLE, ONTARIO, to make available adequate information to the public regarding, and to consider, a proposed Zoning By-law Amendment to be passed pursuant to Section 34 of the Planning Act.

SUBJECT PROPERTY
The proposed Amendment, being an amendment to the general provisions of General Zoning By-law No. 87-34, will apply to any development where the parking standards are applicable.

EXPLANATORY NOTE
The purpose of the proposed Amendment is:
(1) To modify the parking requirements for retail stores, personal service establishments, service and repair shops and studios by increasing the parking requirement to one parking space for every 30 square metres of gross floor area.
(2) To modify the parking area regulations by establishing minimum widths for driveways (aisles) within a parking area and driveways leading to a parking area, and; by establishing minimum widths for one-way and two-way driveways.
(3) To provide a standard for the provision of parking spaces for the handicapped.

REPRESENTATION
ANY PERSON may attend the public meeting and make written or oral representation either in support of or in opposition to the proposed Amendment. If you are unable to attend, written submissions will be received up to the time of the meeting. Written submissions should include a request for further notification, if so desired.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION relating to the proposed Amendment is available for inspection at this office during regular business hours (8.30 a.m. to 4.30 p.m.). If you have any questions, please contact the Planning Department at this office.
