

Stouffville Midgets up record with 4-1 victory

The Stouffville Canadian Tire Midgets combined excellent pitching with timely hitting to dump Pickering 4-1 in rep ball action Thursday night.

Scott Evans, returning after being sidelined for several games with a hip ailment, gave up only three singles while striking out 14 en route to the victory.

Evans and second baseman Rich Burkholder led the way offensively, each rapping two doubles. Evans had two runs batted in, while Burkholder scored a pair. Jason Yoshida had two singles to round out the Stouffville attack.

Stouffville jumped on Pickering starter Kevin Watson for two quick runs in the first inning, with the big blow being Evans's enormous drive to right, which bounced over the fence 290 feet form home plate for a ground rule double.

The blast scored Chris Burkholder and Evans later scored on an error.
