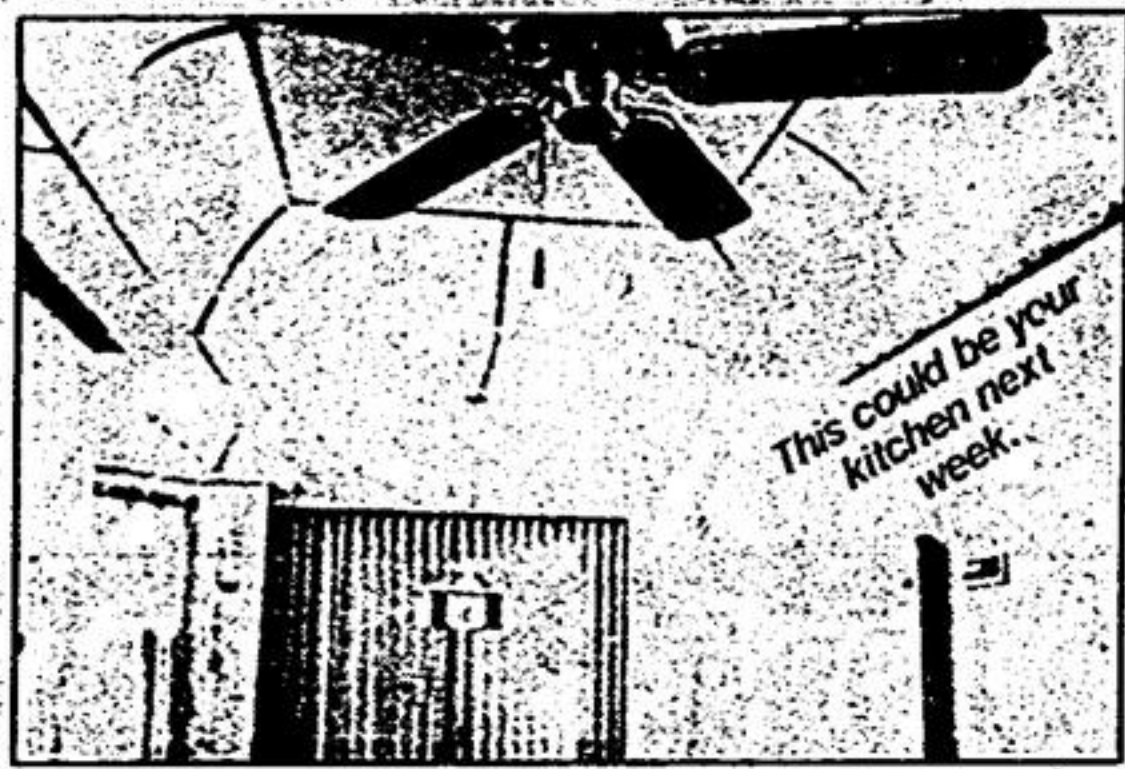

Something for young and old

The Friday evening entertainment program promises to be a highlight of this year's Strawberry Festival. It has been tailored to suit the kids, as well as cater to the cultural tastes of adults. It will run from 7:30 - 9:30 p.m. at the Town Park.

Feature attraction for the evening is a performance by the Scarborough Symphony Orchestra. "The Scarborough Symphony is probably one of the best community symphonies in Canada," says Festival Chairman Jim Heidema. "They are sure to be enjoyed."

And while the moms and dads are savoring the work of the musicians, the kids can look forward to a treat of their own. Local 'Little League Theatre' organizer Steve Payne has put together a "Kiddieland" package that will offer the little ones an opportunity to 'talk with the animals.'

"We're putting together a petting zoo, and we're hoping to have Shakespeare the Magician," says Steve.

Other attractions include a fish pond, a puppet show, clowns, balloons, and cartoons that stress recycling. "There was nothing for the kids in the past," says Steve. "So my wife Bela and I said we'd run the Kiddieland."

The Friday night gala will also see the presentation of the Youth Services award to Wendy Houghton, of Dickson's Hill, as well as the Sports Personality of the Year Award, and the presentation of the Triathlon prizes.

It will wind up with a special presentation to Ralph Spademan, honoring his efforts in the field of recycling while he was owner of Spademan Disposal Services.

The kids get a break

The Stouffville Lions are inviting the whole town out for dinner to-night. Their beef barbecue is back again at this year's Strawberry Festival, this time with an added twist for the children. "We thought we'd try offering hot dogs for the kids," says event organizer Bill Hodges.

For \$2.50, the youngsters will be able to purchase a frankfurter, a drink and dessert. For everyone else, its barbecued hip of beef, complete with coleslaw, tomatoes, a bun, a drink and a dessert consisting of either pie or strawberries.

And while the dinner is scheduled to run from 5:30 til 7:30, Mr. Hodges assures us it will keep going until the beef runs out, or the people have all gone. "We'll have six forty pound roasts on the spits," he says. "And a few ten pound roasts ready if we should need them."

Once again, the Assinck Brothers of Markham have donated their two big spits for the occasion. And the Lions will be there en masse to keep up with the demand.

"It is always well attended," says Mr. Hodges. "There are usually over a thousand people between the kids, the adults, and the seniors."

Cost of the dinner is \$5 for adults, with seniors and under twelves paying \$4. Site is the pavilion at the Town Park.

Festival pie contest

The Stouffville B.I.A. wants to find out just who makes the best strawberry pie in town.

In a new Strawberry Festival event, the Strawberry Pie Baking Contest, the Main Street merchants will be offering a wooden trophy carved by Gary Mumford, and a set of cookbooks donated by The Snowbird, to the persons who can best tickle the taste buds of the judges.

"All you have to do to enter is bake a fresh strawberry pie," says B.I.A. president Sandy Stronach. "We're hoping to have as many as 50 pies entered. Everyone is welcome."

Entrants will be accepted right up to 9 a.m. Saturday morning, at which time the pies will be judged. The judges are both well qualified to handle their assignment. Stouffville's Pat Byer, who has baked more pies in her lifetime than she can remember, will share the task with Les Broadbent, the gourmet chef who owns and operates "The Corner House" Restaurant on Main Street East in Stouffville.

The judging will be done at the Civic Square, immediately in front of the municipal building. Registration forms are available at The Tribune, Crosswinds and The Snowbird.

Mrs. Stronach is hopeful the public will also have a chance to sample the pies at the end of the contest. "We're going to try to auction the leftovers," she says.
