Late Herb Hisey

Love of his family came first in his life

For Herb Hisey, his Christian faith and love of family were priorities in his life. A lifelong resident of the Stouffville community, Herb died suddenly August 1 at Parkview Home.

Herb was born on Conc. 6,

Markham, Sept. 11, 1908, the son of Levi and Margaret Hisey and a brother for Hilda, Mable, Delos, Charles, Verna, Earl and Irene. Rachel, Gladys and Elgin arrived in future years. Herb is the last surviving member of this family.

In 1918, the Hisey family moved West by train to Cavendish, Alberta. It's interesting to note that along with their personal belongings they took four horses, four cows and one sow ready to deliver.

This venture didn't prove successful. They later returned to farm in Whitchurch Township.

Herb spent most of his life working on area farms. These included the properties of Win Timbers, Edgie Clubine and Charlie Harper. For 29 years, he managed Ringwood Farms, owned and operated by George Rodanz.

Freedom of choice inviting disaster

Dear Editor:

In her speech to the House of Commons—a speech lauded by the pro-choice movement as a passionate defence of a woman's right to choose—Barbara McDougal exposes the erroneous foundation of her own group's stand. She stated: "I speak on behalf of those women who have been faced with bearing a child not of their choosing. It is the mother who bears the ultimate responsibility, and therefore ultimately must have the choice. And make no mistake, women make the right choice."

For a cabinet minister to make such an unfounded generalization as the pivotal premise of her argument is baffling. It shows clearly the irrational nature of the pro-choice position. To accept her statement, we would have to believe that being a woman guarantees infallibility. Women simply don't always make the right choices. They are as capable of making mistakes as anyone else.

Nor can it be demonstrated that the individual woman (or man for that matter) is always in the best position to decide what's right for her (or his) situation. This is particularly the case in times of extreme stress and emotional crisis. All we need to do is look at the tragic number of suicides, the growing problem of prostitution, drug addiction, alcoholism and other social problems, to see clearly that women do not always make the right choice about their own bodies.

And these situations, bad as they are, would become much worse if society did not enact legislation to restrict them and protect the innocent—sometimes from their own actions, (or as in the case with wearing seatbelts—their inactions).

For Ms. McDougal to say that a woman, faced with the tremendous trauma of a crisis pregnancy, is always going to make the right choice, is like saying that a person confronted with suicidal depression is in the best position to know what's right for his or her own interests.

Nor is there any guarantee that a medical practitioner, who will benefit financially from (to use McDougal's own words) the "killing of an unborn child", is going to counsel correctly. One only has to look at the record of some of the horrific abortion treadmills in the United States to see that some doctors can be as inhumane, selfish and immoral as the worst of us.

To leave matters of life and death to the distraught individual, or to one who can benefit financially is an invitation for disaster. It is particularly in times of extreme emotional crisis that people need the collective wisdom of a society which recognizes the immeasurable intrinsic value of all human life, including both mothers and unborn children; and will offer encouragement, support, and (as with the case of the person ready to leap off the bridge to her death) restraint.
