

All we need to do is look at the tragic number of suicides, the growing problem of prostitution, drug addiction, alcoholism and other social problems, to see clearly that women do not always make the right choice about their own bodies.

And these situations, bad as they are, would become much worse if society did not enact legislation to restrict them and protect the innocent---sometimes from their own actions, (or as in the case with wearing seatbelts--their inactions).
