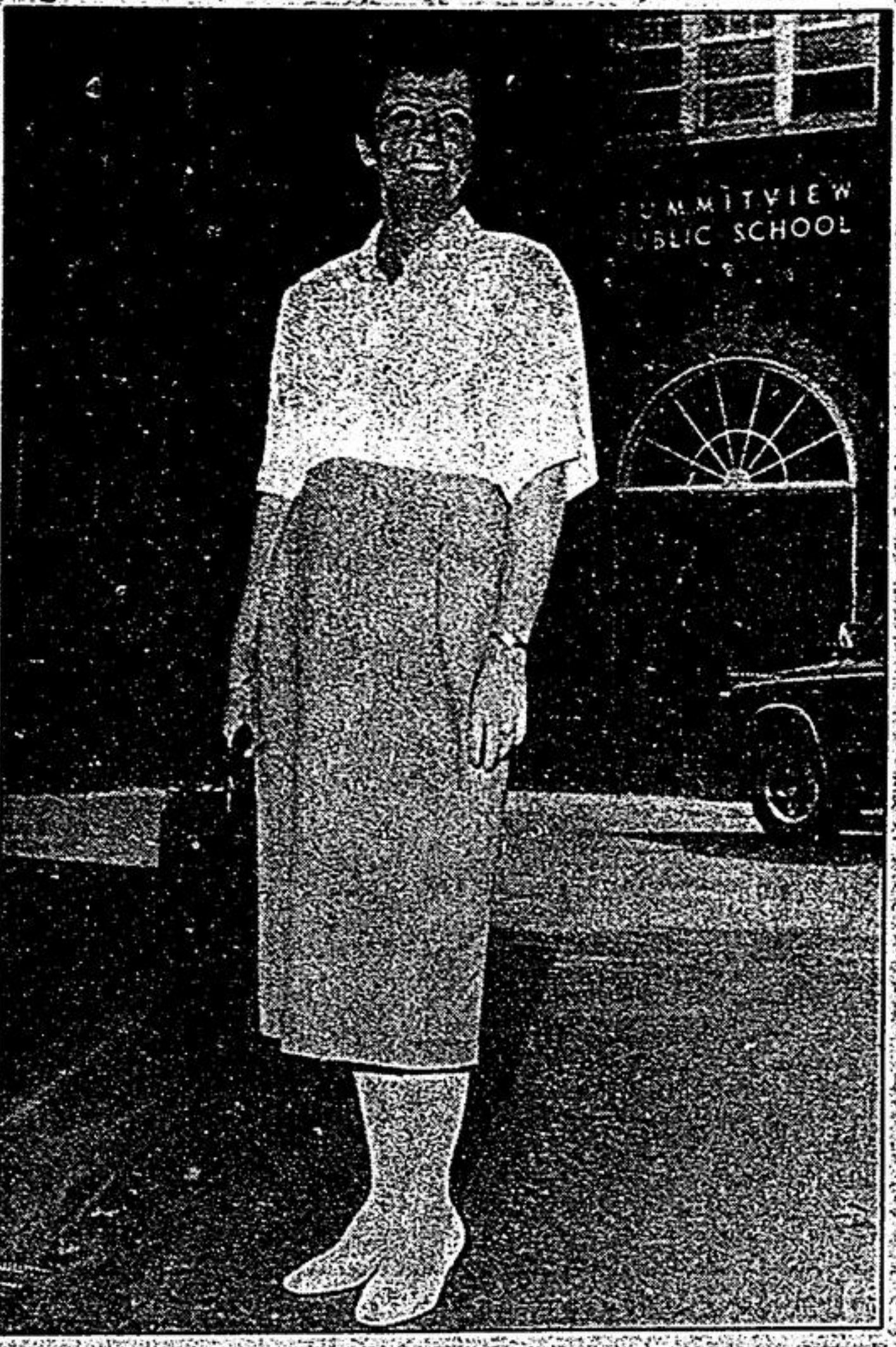


Summitview vice-principal

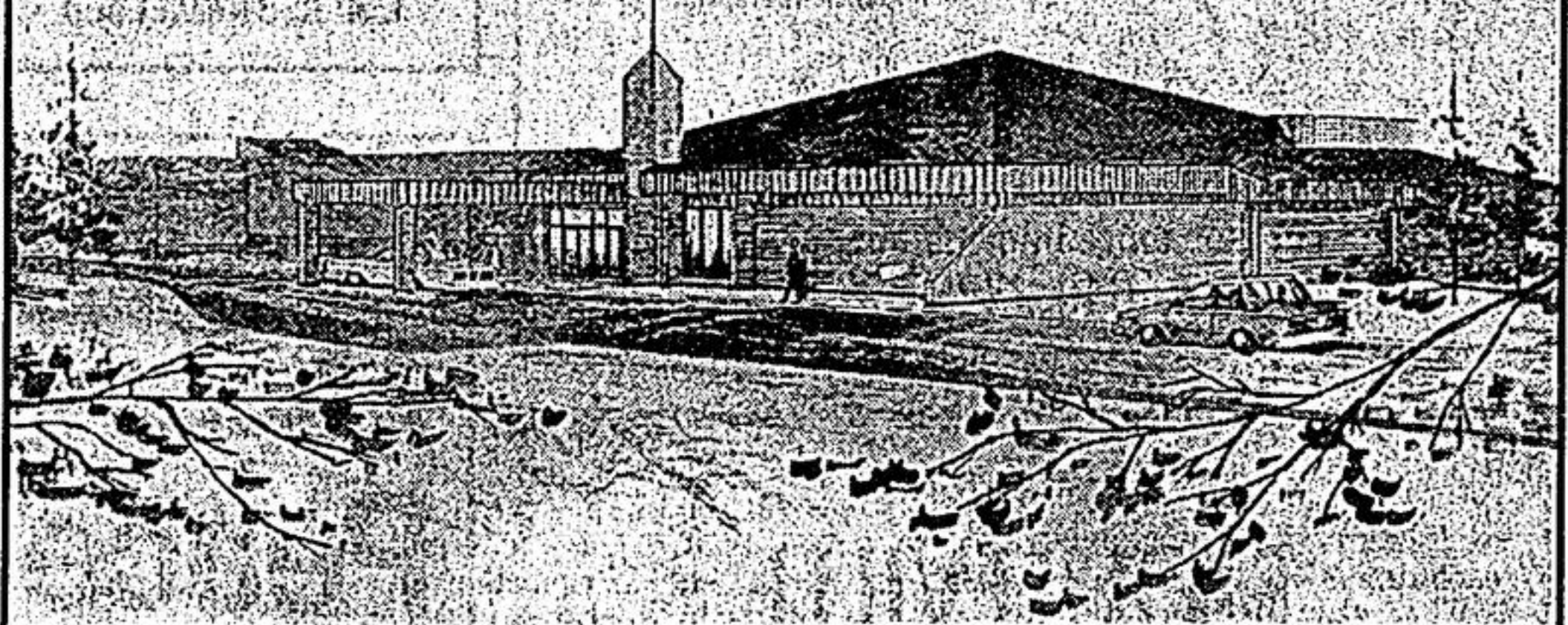

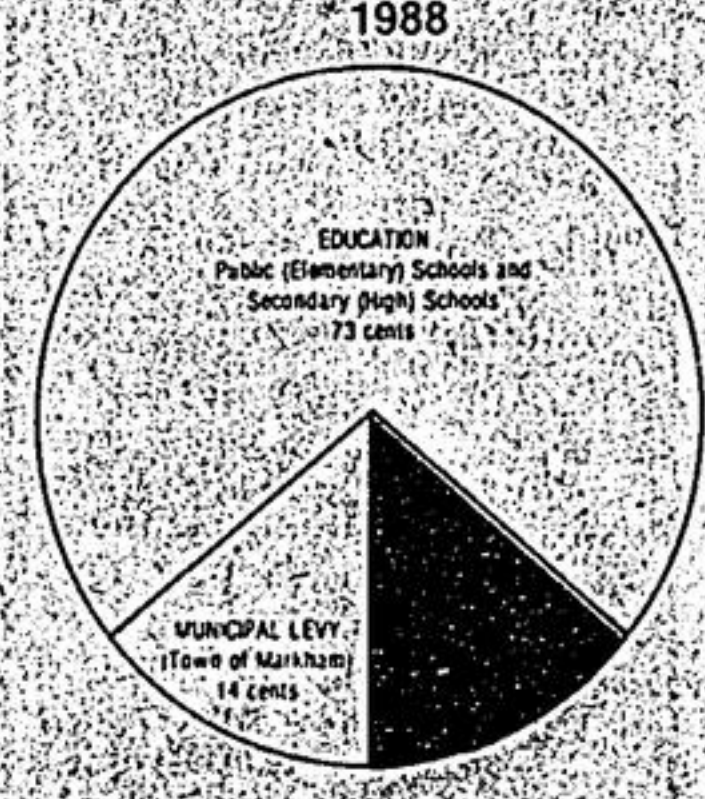
