The animal was only a short distance from the five older children who were playing on the swings.

I consider it very unfair that anyone should be forced to leave a public place in fear, caused by irresponsible youths on a power trip. Had the dog attacked any of us, the result would have been traumatic. Had it attacked either of my twins, it would likely have been fatal because of their size. Our only protection was to leave.

I have written to the mayor calling for more stringent laws restricting these animals. I believe a total ban is justifiable as it has already been seen that these dogs can kill and can escape from even the most responsible owners.

I hope we do not wait until something tragic happens in Stouffville before restrictive measures are taken.

I encourage other concerned individuals, especially parents, to contact those in local authori-

ty, calling on them to do so.
