All systems GO!

By KATE GILDERDALE. STOUFFVILLE — All systems are go for Whitchurch-

Stouffville's Blue Box Curbside Recycling Program, due to begin the week of Oct. 31.

Steve Payne, events coordinator for the launch, is pleased with the response.

"People are really interested. When we had the booth at the Trade Show, the response was great. Folks were asking all sorts of questions," he said.

As director of the Town's Little League Theatre, Steve is delighted his play, "Rip Van Beanie" brought home the importance of recycling to many residents.

"The play has helped in raising the consciousness levels of people in the community as well as in other communities where it's been performed," he claims.

The most important message to give people, Steve points out, is what materials should be placed in the Blue Boxes.

"Only certain items can be accepted — glass pop bottles, aluminum cans, tin cans and newspapers are all fine," he explains.

He points out that jars and bottles should have their lids and labels removed and should be rinsed. "Otherwise, they attract wasps and bees, especially in warm weather."

The program can't handle plastics, magazines and telephone directories. They should go to the dump because they contain staples and glue.

The Recycling Group isn't stopping here.

"We hope to set up an exchange program, with a used goods area where folks can bring items they don't want, like an aluminum screen door," Steve says.

Explains Steve: "People bringing items to this area would be able to take something in exchange. A recycling group in the United States called Work on Waste, operates a similar program. They recycle up to 80 percent of their community's garbage."

The Blue Boxes will be emptied weekly on regular garbage collection days.

"Anything that can't be taken will be put back with a refusal sticker attached," Steve states.

A creative approach can also help cut down on garbage, believes Steve. For example, he removes the tops from bleach bottles then uses them as containers.

"We should be using our resources to save our resources," he points out.

As part of the Blue Box recycling launch, performances of Rip Van Beanie and a recycling contest are planned for area elementary schools. Winners from each classroom will be invited to represent their schools at the official launch ceremony, Oct. 31 at Latham Hall. Time of this event is 12 noon.

On Saturday, Oct. 29, volunteers will begin delivery of the Blue Boxes at 8 a.m.

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
