## Environment law for laymen

Many area residents are concerned about preserving the environment, but may not be aware of legal strategies that can be used to protect it.

York University is offering a course called Environment Protection Law, and was designed for those interested in learning legal strategies for dealing with environmental problems. The course begins Nov. 2.

Topics covered include the new

Spills Act, the Environmental Protection Act and how to present a case before the Environmental Assessment Board. The course takes place three consecutive Wednesday evenings from 7 to 10 p.m. The fee is \$60. For more information call 736-5025.
