Inspects Jamaica damage

STOUFFVILLE — Ged Stonehouse of Stonehouse Travel, Stouffville, recently returned from hurricane-ravaged Jamaica with a first-hand report on conditions there.

Mr. Stonehouse was despatched to the Caribbean holiday haven by the Association of Canadian Travel Agencies. He inspected conditions in the company of the Jamaican Minister of Tourism.

"Canadian travel retailers needed to know if they should be selling Jamaica," Stonehouse said, "and I was anxious to go because our office had sent two relief groups immediately following the storm."

While some areas were hit harder than others, 80 percent of Jamaica's hotels will be back in operation by this weekend, (Oct. 14-15); and 95 percent will be ready by mid-November," he stated.

The majority of hotel owners are taking advantage of the forced interruption to do a complete refurbishing job on their buildings, Stonehouse said. "Many will be better than they were before," he stated.

Mr. Stonehouse reported his findings at a press conference in Toronto, Friday.

Drug arrests

UXBRIDGE — Two Uxbridge men are among 18 people facing drug trafficking charges following a three-month probe by Durham Regional Police.

The investigation, dubbed Operation Corkscrew, culminated in the arrests.

But police say drugs seized in the investigation do little to stem the flow.

During the probe, police officers purchased various quantities of drugs over a three-month period, including cocaine, hashish, marijuana and percodan. The drugs had an estimated street value of \$7,000.

Uxbridge residents facing drug trafficking charges are Donald Norman Grant, 22, of Main Street and Andrew Michael Williams, 24, of Brock Street West.


