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## 'Friends' alienated Morley

STOUFFVILLE — For a brief moment, Friday, Fran Sainsbury supporters sat squirming on their seats.

The incident occurred near the conclusion of an All-Candidates Forum at Stouffville Dist. Secondary School.

It related to Stouffville's inclusion on 'The Big Pipe', the huge York-Durham sanitary sewerage system that crosses Markham, south of Hwy. 7.

Mayor Sainsbury momentarily dropped her guard on cost coverage of the service. Candidate Wilf Morley was quick out of the corner.

Morley charged developers should absorb 100 percent of the expense since they would eventually benefit. He further claimed the incumbent had alienated those regional representatives in the municipalities of Markham, Richmond Hill and Vaughan.

"We must get in there and negotiate," he advised, "we need every one of those people. Our mayor has alienated most of them."

He also objected to the use of the word 'pawns' mentioned by Mayor Sainsbury with reference to the Town's position of strength at the Region.

Earlier, Morley got in a quick left jab when he stated: "Whitchurch-Stouffville is crying for leadership."

Mrs. Sainsbury responded with "everyone knows 'The Big Pipe' will be paid for by developers." She said further that even with support from the majority of municipalities, Markham, Richmond Hill and Vaughan still hold the balance of power.

A shortage of affordable housing was the Forum's most contentious issue. None of the candidates had an immediate solution although Don Bigioni, (Ward 6), suggested negotiating with would-be developers as the most direct method.

Councillor Jim Sanders, (Ward 6), said the problem is region-wide and should be dealt with at the regional level.

Both Sainsbury and Morley advised against use of the old arena site for this purpose.

Crawford Thomson, also a mayoralty candidate, recommended "grouping people together."

"As a 21-year-old, my biggest concern is having a roof over my head," he said.

Mayor Sainsbury explained that only 77 units could be accommodated in the present sewage system. She predicted no major residential build-up in Stouffville for at least five years.

## Off-street complex

STOUFFVILLE — For the past several months, residents have been watching the progress of a building at the rear of The Earl of Whitchurch, Main Street West, not knowing its purpose.

The facts are these:

It's a 7,200 square foot office and commercial facility.

The Earl's Court Whitchurch-Stouffville Office and Commercial Complex should be completed by Dec. 1. The owner and building is Michael Larkin of Maylar Construction Co., Markham.

The complex will include six retail spaces on the ground floor and six offices above. A walkway will extend to Main Street with parking for 35 cars.

The site was purchased from Stouffville Machine Inc., located immediately to the north.

The commercial units have areas as small as 400 square feet, Mr. Larkin said. However, these can be combined to make up to 2,000 square feet if required. Lease offers are now being accepted.

A Grade 12 student of SDSS, Debra remains in intensive care and assisted by a breathing machine but fully conscious.

"She understands when we talk," her mother said, "and today, she waved to one of her friends."

## Team hazing almost fatal

CLAREMONT — An initiation or 'hazing', forced on two members of the Kent State University hockey team, almost killed a 19-year-old Claremont student, The Tribune was told Monday.

Tim Evans, son of Dean and Carolyn Evans, Barkley Street, Claremont, collapsed after being forced-fed alcohol in the basement of a private home.

He spent three days in hospital including 24 hours in intensive care.

Tim is attending Kent State on a hockey scholarship.

"It was pretty scary for awhile," Dean Evans, his father said, "Tim almost died."

Mr. and Mrs. Evans motored to Ohio on learning of the near-tragedy.

Dean said 'hazing' is common at most universities in both Canada and the United States. "This one got out of hand," he stated.

Tim's lapsing into unconsciousness was due to an allergic reaction," Dean explained.

"Due to the seriousness of the incident, all hockey games involving the Kent State team have been cancelled for the season," Dean said.

"This is severe, but I feel the university did the right thing," he stated.

Tim, he said, is determined to continue his studies and complete his year.

"Right now, he wants to get on with life and forget about the whole thing," his father concluded.

The classic car, one of only 452 made by Ford and one of only 39 known to exist in North America, was purchased by Denny and Donna Alsop at the Christian School auction held at Wilson's Sales Arena, Uxbridge, Saturday.

The purchase price was \$16,000.

"I knew it was around," Denny said later, "they're very rare."

The local insurance agent already owns a 1935 Ford sedan delivery; a 1938 Ford panel; a 1948 Chev one-ton and a 1966 Corvette.

He admits he's not quite sure what he's going to do with his latest acquisition.

The heavily-chromed automobile, powered by a v-12 engine and equipped with power windows, cruise control and other extras, was donated to the auction by Mr. Simmonds, a member of the Christian School board. Its purchase price new was said to be \$4,500.

While the Continental attracted much attention, a pair of skybox tickets for the first Blue Jay game in the Skydome, also rolled up bids. Trustee Bert Dekkema of Unionville was successful at a price of \$200 each.

"It's historic," Mr. Dekkema said of the upcoming event. He's already asked a friend to go along.

A bedroom suite brought \$2,000 and a GE color TV sold for \$500.

One quilt sold twice. The first purchaser bought it for \$650; then donated it back. It sold a second time for \$500.

Altogether, the sale grossed close to \$34,000. The money will go towards the purchase of two new portables at the site.

Auctioneer Neil Bacon was in charge.
