A host of awards and bursaries were presented, all of which are listed on Page A-12 of this issue.


The evening's valedictorian was Jim Baggs, currently attending Queen's University, Kingston.

## Carl Edward Watson

## A town 'institution'

STOUFFVILLE — Carl Edward Watson, a Stouffville 'institution', was buried Saturday in the family plot at Goodwood Cemetery.

His death, Friday, in Toronto General Hospital, followed an accident in front of Summitview School, early Thursday morning. Carl was struck by a westbound car while crossing Main Street en route downtown. He suffered severe head, chest and abdominal injuries.

Carl was known by almost everyone in Stouffville. Rev. Craig Pitts referred to him as "a people person with scores and scores of friends."

Born at Goodwood, Nov. 6, 1913, Carl moved to Stouffville with his parents and brother Cedric at age 13. The family farmed on the 10th Conc. of Markham. Later, Carl and Cedric built a new home on Tenth Line South. A street leading to the Watson Subdivision bears their name.

From birth, Carl was a victim of cerebral palsy. While his capacity for academic learning was limited, he never lacked for ambition. He assisted on various

rural mail routes and was as well-known around the local Post Office as the postmaster himself.

Rev. Pitts recalled how he would come to the Stouffville Pentecostal Church sometimes two hours in advance of the service. Recently, he said, Carl had given him a single blue flower that he kept on the pulpit two weeks.

"It meant more to me than a dozen long-stemmed roses," he said.

Rev. Pitts told of the friendship afforded Carl by Marilyn Woodrow and how much her kindness was appreciated.

Rev. Pitts described Carl as "a rare jewel whose friendliness was his status symbol."

"A good name is far better than great riches," he stated.

## Sainsbury returned as mayor

Even Fran Sainsbury was surprised at the ease with which she dispatched her two opponents in Monday's municipal elections.

With the unofficial voting totals in, the incumbent mayor picked up 3,530 votes to 2,065 for Wilf Morley and 294 for Crawford Thompson. "I thought it would be a closer race," she said after the final tally was in. "I'm thrilled and excited. I get to keep my happy family — all 17,000 of you (living in Whitchurch-Stouffville)."

"The people have spoken and I have a clear mandate to finish the projects we started," she said.

Mrs. Sainsbury was strong in all parts of the town winning every poll. Mr. Morley, who had been the Ward 5 councillor, had been expected to give Mrs. Sainsbury a good fight.

Mrs. Sainsbury, at the town offices as the vote totals began pouring in, was relaxed and confident. After the results were final, she made a statement, then left for her victory party.

Among the 250 supporters celebrating her win Monday were four generations of her family — her mother, daughter and granddaughter.

Even though his vote total was small, longshot mayoralty hopeful Crawford Thompson was satisfied with his showing. "I feel pretty good, I'm happy with the result," he said.

He would definitely consider running again "one day" in the future, he said.

In other races Ward 6 incumbent Jira Sanders easily outdistanced opponent Don Bigioni by 852 votes to 461. Mr. Sanders saw it as an endorsement for his platform.

"It does provide a mandate for getting on with things I've been talking about for a long time," Mr. Sanders said. "A lot of people have said they want an (indoor swimming) pool, and that's something I've been pushing for."

Now that the election is over, he wants to get on with the job.

The closest council race was in Ward 3 where Nick Tatone beat out Johan Aaltink for the seat left vacant by the retirement of Jim Rae. Mr. Tatone garnered 461 votes to Mr. Aaltink's 333.

In the race for Ward 5, the seat left vacant by Mr. Morley, Doug Alles easily defeated local business woman Marie Adams 1,014 to 374.

Councillors Wayne Emerson (Ward 4) and Margot Marshall (Ward 1), who had both won by acclamation, dropped by the municipal offices to keep tabs on the results.

Mrs. Marshall said she was looking forward to the next term. "It should be very interesting this time round," she said.

Ron Robb was also acclaimed in Ward 2.

Public school board trustee Harry Bowes was also acclaimed.

This year's turnout was 5,844 voters representing 43 per cent of those eligible.

## Uxbridge mayor coasts to victory

UXBRIDGE — Gerri-Lynn O'Connor is back for another three-year term as mayor of Uxbridge Township. Mrs. O'Connor coasted to a one-sided victory over freshman candidate Larry Lee of Goodwood.

The vote count was 3,999 for O'Connor; 1,086 for Lee.

In the race for regional council, veteran Don Jackson easily defeated rival Larry Austin, 3,276 to 1,776.

Councillor Barry Bushell was acclaimed in Ward 4. Heather Beveridge was returned to the Durham Region Public School Board also by acclamation.

## Comeback fails

PICKERING — George Ashe, a provincial cabinet minister in the Davis Government and a former Pickering mayor, attempted a comeback Monday, but failed.

He was defeated by Wayne Arthur, 7,510 to 6,533 in a two-way Pickering mayoralty race. Arthur succeeds Mayor Jack Anderson who retired.

In Ward 3, candidate Rick Johnson held to the motto that, if at first you don't succeed, try, try again. Johnson tried again Monday, and won, out-distancing his closest rival, Lloyd Thomas of Whitevale, 1,657 to 1,201. Larry O'Leary trailed with 615.

Ward 3 Regional Councillor Beverley Morgan defeated candidate Enricho Pistrutto, 1,701 to 1,534.

## Shoppers buy plaza drug store

STOUFFVILLE — Widdifield Drugs Ltd., in the A&P Plaza, has been sold.

The purchaser is Shoppers Drug Mart, a chain that includes 300 stores across Ontario.

The sale is effective Nov. 30.
