recently involved, he says it doesn't bother him. "I get kidded a lot, but I don't take any of it seriously. I know they're only joking." He does hope other boys will realize that the clubs offer a wide variety of interesting topics and that some of them will consider joining a project group in the future.

The project sometimes involve field trips, and David has attended the annual luncheon at the Royal York Hotel, sponsored by the Kiwanis, which recognizes the work of 4-H clubs.

"In August I was invited to a 4-H conference at the CNE for the weekend." Both town and rural clubs came; there were about 200 of us altogether."

They took part in a skill-a-thon, covering areas such as first aid and how to cope in different emergencies. They also learned something about judging livestock from the rural group.

Through his involvement, David has made many new friends. He doesn't go into every club, he notes, just those he's interested in.

"I'm hoping to continue," he says. "I've done as many as three clubs in a year, it just depends on what's being offered." He describes 4-H as a

youth club where skills can be acquired or improved on.

Both his sisters and his older brother have been involved in projects, and he and his younger sister, Catherine, have joined the same clubs.

The club has no membership dues and you don't need special qualifications to take part in a project. "If we need anything, we usually get donations," David states. 4-H is open to young people up to the age of 21 in both urban and rural areas.

When David leaves Stouffville District Secondary School, he's hoping to go to the Royal Military College in Kingston to train as a mechanical engineer in the army, and he's currently enrolled in the army cadets. He also enjoys sports:

"I play hockey with the high school Friday mornings. I've tried out for the volleyball and basketball teams, but I haven't been successful yet."

In the meantime, the Grade 11 student has got his hands full with 4-H, cadets, sports and that unpopular pastime, homework. He doesn't have time to wonder what to do next.

Uxbridge man goes to jail

UXBRIDGE — A 24-year-old Uxbridge man, arrested during an undercover drug investigation, has been jailed one year.

Andrew Michael Williams of Brock Street, entered a plea of guilty to having cocaine for the purpose of trafficking plus five counts to trafficking in a narcotic.

The case was heard in Whitby Court.

According to evidence, the accused sold cocaine and hashish to an undercover police officer on four occasions.

Durham Regional Police arrested Williams Sept. 27. He and 17 others were charged. The street value of drugs seized totalled approximately \$7,000.

French Language Advisory Committee

A meeting is being called for Tuesday, December 6, 1988 at 8:00 p.m. to elect six French speaking ratepayers to serve on the French Language Advisory Committee of The York Region Board of Education. This meeting will be held at The York Region Board of Education Administrative Centre, 60 Wellington Street West, Aurora.

The Advisory Committee shall make recommendations to the School board with respect to ways and means of meeting the educational and cultural needs of French speaking pupils in York Region.

Eligibility to serve on this committee is restricted to those French speaking ratepayers who have the qualifications required but are not members of the Board of Education as outlined in the Education Act 1985, namely:

- 196(1) A person is qualified to be elected as a member of a board if he is:
 (a) a Canadian citizen;
 (b) of the full age of eighteen years;
 (c) a resident within the area of jurisdiction of the board; and
 (d) a public school elector.

 (d) être un contribuable pour les écoles publiques.
