**NOTICE OF HYDRO RATE INCREASE  
NEW MONTHLY RETAIL RATES  
EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1st, 1989**

On January 1st, 1989, Ontario Hydro will increase the cost of power to our Utility of 6%.

To cover this major portion of our budget, and to continue with major capital improvements to your hydro service, including water heater rentals, all customer bills, effective February 1, 1989, will reflect a proposed average rate increase for power used on and after January 1, 1989, of 6.5%. The following rates, subject to Ontario Hydro approval, will apply.

All rates are net. Accounts paid after the due date are subject to an additional charge of 5% for late payment. February and March bills will be pro-rated. All customers will receive a copy of the new rates with their billing.

Bills are payable by mail, or at our office at 130 Main Street West only. At the present time we are unable to take payments through banking institutions.
