Cost concerns

Alleged cut-backs in provincial education grants will highlight a public meeting Wednesday (tonight) at Stouffville Dist. Secondary School.

The Ontario Public Education Network supported by various Home and School Associations is hosting the discussion. A principal speaker will be Robt. Cressman, Director of Education, Region of York. Bill Ballinger, MPP for Durham-York has been invited.

Educators claim current under-funding by the province places an ever-increasing tax burden on local municipalities. In 1975-76 they say, the public education system received 11.3 percent of the provincial budget and separate schools 3.8 percent. In 1987-88 payments into the public sector were reduced to 6.2 percent with the separate system increasing to 4.2 percent.

development on the 9th Conc. of Whitchurch-Stouffville, south of the Vivian Road, opened Monday in Latcham Hall.

Arguments, expected to last two weeks, concern an application by O.T. Baggio for permission to build 17 homes on a 25-acre property at Lot 30, Conc. 9.

Originally, the request was for 22 homes. A year after, this number was cut back to eleven. The application was refused.

Mr. Baggio filed an appeal to the O.M.B.

Later, area residents learned Council had changed its mind, agreeing to support the 17-lot plan. This caught opponents unprepared so the hearing was rescheduled to Dec. 5.

Lawyer Stanley Stein, representing the ratepayers, suggested that since the proposal before the Board was for 22 homes and not the 17 now planned,

the application should be turned back to the Town for further discussion.

The objection was overruled by the chairman who claimed numbers of lots as irrelevant.

Mr. Stein recommended a visit to the site. "The topography doesn't lend itself to the number of homes proposed," he said.

The chairman agreed, pending approval by all parties.

Pudge Hartshorne, one of 25 residents in attendance, said she was satisfied their case was being heard.

"We're being listened to and that's what we want," she stated.

Jenny Renewych said lack of support by the Town was disappointing.

"We're on our own," agreed ratepayer Vern Morrow.

"I'm pleased the O.M.B. has agreed to visit the site. Hopefully, this will lead to something," he concluded.
