# Atom Clippers earn a win then drop a pair

 The Stouffville Atom Clippers tasted victory early last week in round robin playoff action, but took it on the chin twice as the week wore on.

Michael Underwood's goal, scored while he was on his knees, gave the Clippers a 3-2 win over Port Perry on the road Monday. Stouffville had taken a 2-0 lead into the final period on a penalty shot goal by Roger McMann, and a Peter Smith tip in of a Chad Dickinson pass.


But the Port crew roared back with two to tie it early in the third. After being brought to his knees at the crease, Underwood lifted the puck into the Port Perry net for the game winner. John McKinnon and Ian "Turk" Ellis drew assists on the play.

The Clippers fell just short at home on Wednesday, dropping a 4-3 squeaker to Cobourg. The two teams traded goals in the first period, and then again in the second, with Smith and Michael Boyd doing the damage for Stouffville.

Cobourg hit for a pair of markers in the third period, with McKinnon's goal, on a great pass from Smith, being too little too late for the Clippers.

Back in Cobourg Friday, Stouffville never recovered from a 3-0 second period deficit, eventually losing 4-2.

Stouffville takes on Cobourg yet again Wednesday (Feb. 1) at the Recreation Centre at 7 p.m., before going back to Port Perry for a game Friday. The two teams will square off in Stouffville Sunday afternoon at 4 p.m. in further playoff action.

# Oldtimers clash for first time in benefit contest

 While it could be seen as a battle of the grey-bearded pucksters, unlike most skirmishes, everyone will win this game.

Stouffville's two men's oldtimer hockey teams will faceoff for the first time ever in a benefit hockey game for Ernie Kennedy, the Stouffville area man who lost both arms in a gravel accident last year. The game will be played Feb. 25 at the Recreation Centre.

The contest will pit the Chefero Sand and Gravel Stouffville Classics against the Betz Clippers Oldtimers, fresh off their big victory in the annual Ernestown Oldtimers' Tournament Jan. 22.

"It's certainly not a grudge match," says Jim Wagg, manager of the Chefero team. "We decided several years ago

we wouldn't play against each other because we didn't want a rivalry to develop. The two teams work closely together."

Wagg claims the game evolved from the players' decision to do what they could do to help Kennedy, who is now convalescing at home after a futile attempt was made to reattach his limbs in hospital.

"We had a meeting and decided this was a good cause, and that we should arrange a game between the two teams for the first time."

According to Wagg, the Recreation Centre holds 1,100 people, and he's determined to fill it.

"The Lions will run the bar, and Don Lloyd is going to donate his hand, 'Country Gold'."

Wagg says Kennedy's neighbours have volunteered to

man the ticket window, and the Stouffville Amateur Hockey Association will hold a 50-50 draw. Wayne Nugent, referee in chief of the SAHL, will line up referees free of charge.

Clippers Oldtimers manager Al Hachey says neither team wants to see the game become one-sided.

"We're rated as a C team, whereas the Classics would be a little higher than that. But nobody wants to see a runaway in either direction."

Both teams are strictly tournament clubs, with the Clippers Oldtimers playing in Canadian Oldtimers Hockey Association tournaments.

The Classics are coached by Ray Steel. John Boyd stands behind the Clipper Oldtimer's bench directing traffic.
