Music lesson tax protested

Dear Editor: We, the undersigned, oppose the Federal Government's intention to tax music lessons.

The proposed tax is meant to apply to consumer services. As music teachers, we feel our job is one of education, not one of service.

The Ontario Ministry of Education awards a credit towards the Secondary School diploma to students who pass the Royal Conservatory Grade 8 practical and Grade 2 theory examinations.

A Grade 13 credit is awarded to our students who pass Grade 9 practical and Grade 3 theory. The musical examinations are possible only through private music study which we provide.

Our students continue to be the nurturers of Canadian culture. A tax on their musical education could mark the beginning of the end of private music study except for the elite few.

Canadian musicians win prizes internationally. This could stop if talented students cannot afford to take lessons because of added tax on each lesson.
