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Family rescued from car

DICKSON'S HILL — Two children and their parents were rescued by four area men Monday morning after their 1971 Ford careened into a branch of the Rouge River and landed on its side in more than a foot of water.

According to an eye-witness, driver Debra Miller, 26; children Natasha Miller, three; Bradley Miller, four and 27-year old James Thompson were trapped in their vehicle when it skidded out of control on an icy patch of 19th Avenue, east of old Hwy. 48.

Jack Fraser, an employee of Barker Roofing, directly across from the accident site, said co-workers Al Toner and Hector Prevost saw the car land on its side in the stream.

They ran back to Barker's to call an ambulance and recruit more men to assist in the rescue.

Fraser was one of those men.

When the group returned to the scene, Natasha "was underwater (in the car). The little boy (Bradley) was leaning on her and holding her under because the car was on its side."

Fraser said the auto was supported by several trees that "prevented it from flipping on its roof."

Toner, Prevost, Fraser, and co-worker Joel Molnar then formed a human chain from the car to the top of the river. They passed the children to the waiting arms of an unidentified woman, Fraser said.

He said the children were "shaken up and wet" following their ordeal. "They kept asking for mom."

Fraser said ambulance attendants placed a splint on the mother's leg and a brace around her neck. The residence of the family and further details concerning injuries were unavailable at press time.

An increase of almost 23 per cent is anticipated.

Separate school supporters will be hit even harder. They face a hike of 26 per cent.

Enrolment, explains Bowes, is up 7.5 per cent but provincial grants have dropped 11.4 per cent.

The Board chairman says a determined effort is being made to chop costs wherever possible. Even summer school may be made a pay-your-own-way service, he stated.

One area of concern, said Bowes, is transportation with the figure climbing to \$22 million this year as opposed to \$18 million in 1988.

Budget night is May 1.
