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Pretty scary Taxes likely to double

Residential taxes could double in 1989. This is the gloom and doom prediction by Whitchurch-Stouffville Mayor Fran Sainsbury.

While the Town, she says, is attempting to keep its increase down to 5.3 percent, the cost of living, the Region's budget has shot up by 20.6 percent and York Board of Education is predicting a 24 percent hike.

The Catholic School cost increase is even higher at 26 percent. Mayor Sainsbury describes the situation as "pretty scary". While the Town's attempting to hold the line at 5.3 percent, Mrs. Sainsbury admits this isn't realistic if the municipality is forced to go it alone on the installation of stoplights at Stouffer Street and Winona Drive.

Since Main Street's a provincial highway, she feels Queen's Park should subsidize the cost of both projects.

With respect to the tax increase over-all, Mayor Sainsbury says it's the person on fixed income that's hurt the most.

Mrs. Sainsbury's calling for a change in the Act that would force developers to provide school sites to municipalities free of charge. She says, too, all schools should be open and ready to go when families move in.

School won't support harbourfront Prom

STOUFFVILLE — The Student Council of Stouffville Dist. Secondary School is holding a Spring Prom but the administration's withdrawn support.

Principal Peter Bright made the announcement Thursday.

His meeting with The Tribune was attended by Council President Julian Franklin.

Earlier, Mr. Bright urged the

committee to hold the Prom in the High School gym. Anywhere else, he said, and it would constitute a "private event", with no school association whatsoever.

So far, the ultimatum's been ignored. The Prom will take place May 26 on board a boat in Toronto Harbour.

The cost is \$90 per couple.

Mr. Bright bases his decision

"on what I've seen over the last two years. I don't want to be a part of it again."

When asked to be specific, Principal Bright said the inclusion of a bar, "and the behavior of a few kids", places too much responsibility on staff chaperones.

He described the consumption of alcohol as "a curse".

Mr. Bright said he'll be holding discussions with the dance executive in an effort to change their minds.

He feels the gymnasium could be decorated appropriately for the occasion.

"The Christmas formal was held here and the kids had a marvellous time," he stated.

Mr. Bright voiced disappointment at Council's decision. He said a legal contract had been drawn up and co-signed by a parent.

"It's important for the community to know this will not be a school dance," he stressed. He said any teachers attending will do so as private citizens.

Franklin said the committee's choice of sites "is not a form of rebellion against Mr. Bright or members of staff. It was felt the dance would be better attended elsewhere."

The Council president admitted under-age drinking will likely occur. "Alcohol is tied into a good time. One person could ruin the night for everyone. We're not blind to the situation."

The executive, he said, is hoping to obtain student and parent chaperones as well as bus transportation to and from Toronto.

Mr. Bright estimates the cost at between \$500 and \$600 a couple when everything's included.

Community support of this worthwhile project will be appreciated.




