**SDSS student brilliant in math contest**

STOUFFVILLE — A 13-year-old Grade 9 student attending Stouffville Dist. Secondary School has placed second in York Region; 45th in Ontario and 99th in Canada following results received recently in a Pascal Mathematics Contest.

Margaret Crothers, R.R. 2, Markham, scored a mark of 125.25.

The Canadian average is 67.61. Principal Peter Bright described Margaret's standing as "amazing".

Megan Morrison and Jennifer Ferguson, also of Grade 9, placed second and third respectively.

Margaret will receive an engraved medal at an awards assembly in June. At the same time, she along with Megan and Jennifer will receive 'Certificates of Distinction'.

In the Cayley Mathematics Contest, Derek Sheahan was the top Grade 10 student at S.D.S.S. His score was 88.25, followed by Jean Marquis with 87.75; Robert O'Connor, 87.50 and Doug Henderson, 81.00.

Derek will receive a medal at the June awards assembly. Derek, Jean, Robert and Doug will all receive certificates.

The Canadian average in this division was 65.60.

In the Fermat Mathematics Contest, Kevin Dancy of Grade 11 will receive a medal for his score of 78.75.

The average in Canada was 67.66.

Corina Wilson was second and Rachael Grove third.

"Exciting" was the way Margaret Crothers described the contest.

Participants, she said, knew in advance the results wouldn't affect their academic standings and this eased the pressure.

The tests were written at Stouffville High.

**Hold reunion**

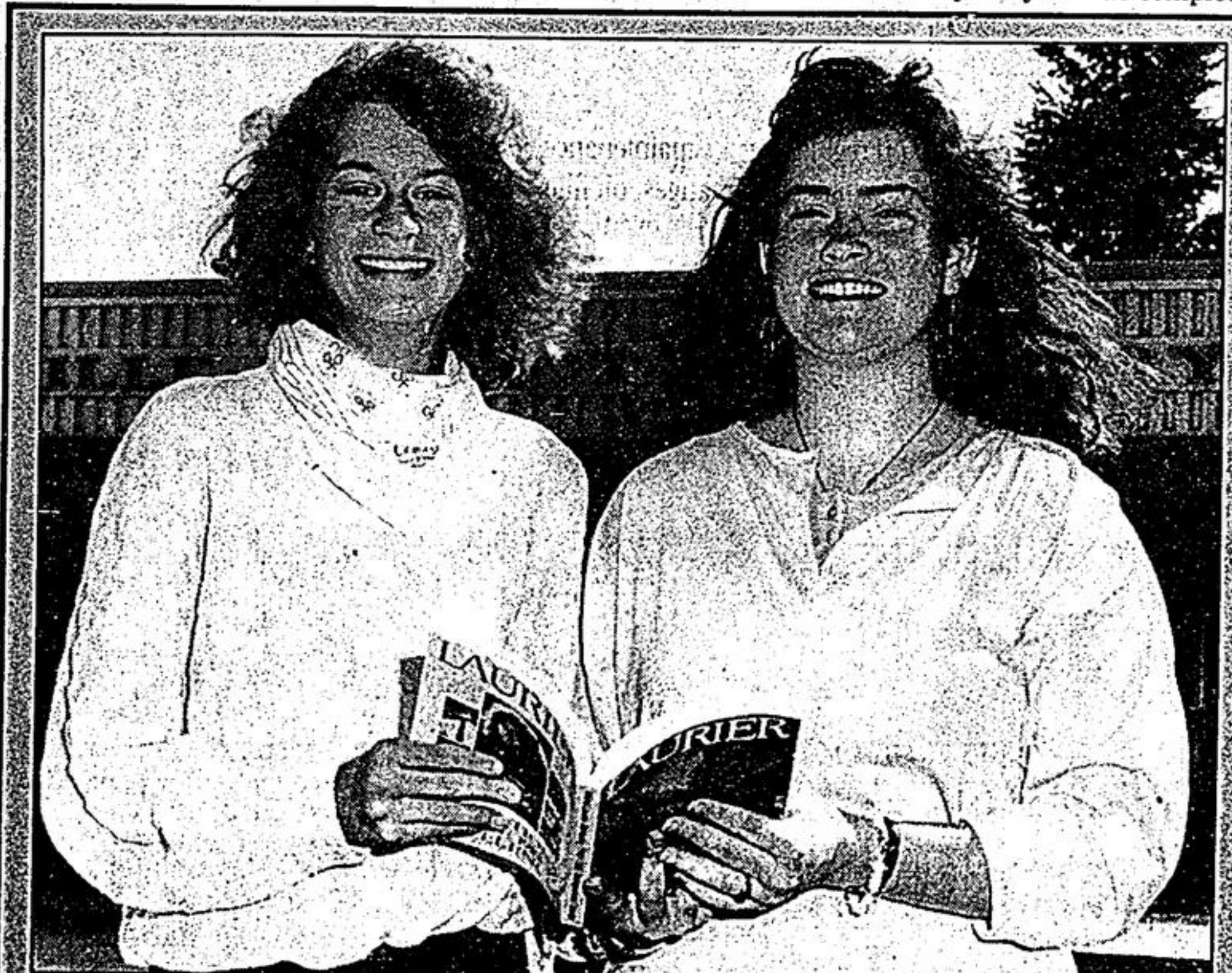
