## Walleye hatching time now

While the walleye spawning season may have already peaked in the streams along Lake Ontario's north shore, there's plenty of creeks further north still waiting for this annual spring run.

Outdoor clubs and associations were out in many areas last week collecting eggs to stock their local jar hatcheries.

Under the watchful guidance and help of the Ministry of Natural Resources staff, the big fish were netted, then put in floating enclosures. When a dozen or so females and three times that many males were so captured and separated in the two tanks, the actual procuring of the eggs began.

As each female was carefully stripped of her eggs, three different male fish were brought up one after the other and held over the same wash basin. Their induced milt would then be stirred gently into the egg mass with a feather to fertilize them.

Time was a factor to be reckoned with as the released eggs of the female are only receptive to the males' fertilizing milt for about two minutes.

When thoroughly mixed in a clean wash basin the now fertile eggs were carefully poured into a large plastic garbage pail containing dissolved Fuller's earth or corn starch. This ingredient helps to harden the eggs and prevents them from sticking together.

The hardening process takes upwards of two hours during which time the eggs are stirred constantly with a goose or turkey wing. Periodically the eggs are washed by pouring off the surplus water with its accumulated impurities and by refilling the container with a fresh supply. Finally the tiny eggs are given a thorough cleaning and tipped into a smaller lidded pail for their journey to the jar hatchery.

## MARKHAM

Most so called jar hatcheries funded by the Community Fishery Involvement Program of the Ministry of Natural Resources have the capacity for up to a million walleye eggs. As each of the specially built bulb-bottomed jars can hold up to 200,000 fish eggs, the number of jars dictates the hatchery capacity.

The Bob's Lake-Loyalist hatchery near Verona has eight jar units, while the Westport Area Outdoor Association on Sand Lake has a four jar hatchery.

Basically these so-called jar hatcheries have a header pipe of running water out of which runs an outlet for each jar. However a long tapered funnel inset into each unit forces the water to disperse from the bottom. The result is an upwelling effect that continually circulates the eggs and carries any foreign matter to the overflow pipe at the top. The whole hatchery is operational when screened water is pumped up to a reservoir barrel on the top of the hatchery and controlled gravity feed send it down and through each individual unit and eventually out the overflow drain.

Jar hatchery operators must keep a close eye on water temperatures and upwelling flow, along with the removal of any dead eggs as well as treating for any fungus that might occur.

Dependent on the weather, these walleye eggs begin to hatch in about two weeks time. The emerging fry, now so small 27,000 will fill a beer mug and can individually swim right through a window screen, are then released.

Those fry that are put in a specially constructed rearing pond until they reach the fingerling size and then transplanted into a lake have the best survival rate.

Yet even those tiny fry that are put directly into the lake have been spared the depredations of suckers, catfish, and other bottom feeders during their development in the egg stage.

Three years from now when some angler pulls a 14-inch walleye out of some nearby lake and says, "Gee, it's kinda small," I wonder if he'll think how small it really was last week on the Napanee River. But the fish's Momma? Now that was a different story. Best of all she's still going strong out there, waiting for some lucky angler to say, "Gee, it's a real big one."
