## She's been special mom to foster kids

Sheila Dowdall is a special mother. Along with raising her own children, she has been a mother to 44 foster children in the last 20 years.

"It's a career to me," Dowdall, 48 says. "That's not too many (children) really. Some foster parents have over 100 children."

Dowdall prefers being a foster mother to infants and toddlers because "it's the age I like and enjoy," she smiles.

While raising her own children, Dowdall felt infants and toddlers would also be easily accepted in-

to the family and because of the age difference, conflicts among the children avoided.

Dowdall soon discovered that being a foster mother is not all joy and bliss.

"Some children are delayed socially or mentally and some have medical problems," she says. "You help the children reach their individual potential."

Dowdall remembers her first foster child having a heart condition. She received proper training to deal with any possible emergencies, handle medication and be prepared before the child was released in her care. Her

own children were ages five to nine at the time.

"They found an ideal family for the baby. The adoptive parents were very special," Dowdall says.

After many years experience, Dowdall knows that being a foster mother differs from being a natural mother.

She believes a foster mother can never replace the child's natural mother but can only deal with problems and situations on an individual bases and provide stability for the child.

Letting go is one of the hardest parts of being a foster mother.

"You don't really have a say in the child's life. Your not a (permanent) legal guardian and you have to let go at some time," she says.

Dowdall believes a bond has grown with each of her foster children, but, "in some more than others. The more needs the child has, the stronger the bond is," and the length of the child's stay plays a significant role in the bond.

"It's difficult to let go. Sometimes you don't see or hear from them again and you wonder what the children think about

you, or about that time in their life," Dowdall says.

The Children's Aid Society has a visiting process that lasts up to a month for adoptive parents.

The foster child and the foster parent visit the adopting parents as part of a gradual process for the child to become comfortable to their new surroundings.

"It's also a lot easier to let go if you receive a visit or phone call from the child and the parents," Dowdall adds. "It doesn't seem finished if the child is just taken."

Foster children that are in temporary care are allowed regular visits with the natural parents.

Another role the foster mother has is to ease the fears of the natural parents and let them know that they are not being replaced.

Dowdall says it's as simple as saying "here's mommy and daddy" while handing the child over to the natural parents or making sure the child is wearing clothes that the natural mother purchased for the child.

Being a foster mother was not new to Dowdall. As she was growing up her parents had been foster parents.

Dowdall felt it was something she wanted to do after her three natural children began school.

Since that time, she has adopted one child and is in the process of adopting another, a girl almost 10 years old.

"It seems like the thing to do at this time," Dowdall says.

Dowdall is also a foster mother for an eight-month-old boy and a

nine-month-old girl.

Despite the fact that two generations of women have been foster mothers, Dowdall does not believe her children will carry on the tradition.

"Society has changed. Family life has changed. Now both parents work, women have careers and won't give them up for a family."
