

NOTICE OF 16TH AVENUE CLASS EA FINAL **ENVIRONMENTAL STUDY REPORT (ESR)** IN PUBLIC RECORD

The Town of Markham has finalized Phase IV of the Class Environmental Assessment for the proposed widening of 16th Avenue and construction of a portion of the proposed Markham By-Pass, and is documented in the Environmental Study Report (ESR).

The ESR was filed on May 19th, 1989, with the Town's Clerk and placed in public record at the four Markham Libraries, where it will be open for review for at least 30 (thirty) days. Objection to the proposed project may be made within the 30 day period and it may become the responsibility of the Minister of Environment to decide if the objection is justified, and therefore, if further environmental assessment is required. If however, no objections are received, the project may then proceed on to the construction stage.

The report documents a description of the following:

- the problem definition and related background information
- the rationale employed in selecting the preferred solution
- and design concept. a summary of environmental consideration and any measures taken to minimize these effects before and after construction.
