Bloomington plan

Water deal reached?

 Months of debate between Bloomington community residents and the proponents of a 101-home subdivision plan could end this week when Whitchurch-Stouffville Town Council is expected to announce a decision.
 Council has been asked to approve modifications to Official Plan amendment No. 25 which would allow developers to proceed with the development on approval of draft plan conditions.
 Until this point, approval had been stymied by residents' concerns about the effects of a proposed municipal water supply system — necessary for a development of this size — on their existing wells.
 Objectives were also raised over the "declaration" homeowners would be required to pay the total costs involved in hooking their individual homes to the municipal supply.
 However, in a bid to "see the project underway," Randy Alcorn, representative for the developers, indicated to Council and residents the proponents have agreed to pay connection costs for existing homes in Bloomington to the municipal piped water system.
 "After much deliberation and thought, the developer has instructed us to put forward the proposal they not only intend to put in the municipal water supply system, but are prepared to provide individual water connections," he said at last Tuesday's council meeting.
 Mr. Alcorn pointed out the proposal would include repairing any damages incurred to the homeowner's property during installation, such as ripping up flower beds or driveway asphalt.
 "Everything will be done in a way to minimize costs, but the project will be done to the satisfaction of the municipality," he stressed. "It will be a condition of the subdivision agreement."
 "We are proposing what the people want," he continued. "We shouldn't have to go any further, we're bending over backwards as it is."
 Mr. Alcorn added that he thought "they were being fair to the residents" with the proposal.
 Following discussion on the issue, Ward 2 Councillor Ron Robb said it was the homeowners' right "to take a few days to think it over."
 One suggestion from residents at the meeting included being presented with a copy of the subdivision agreement when it is drawn up.
 Concluded homeowner Bob Lewis: "I think I can speak for everyone. The fact is we took an awful lot of meetings to get this, now I feel pretty happy with the outcome and I say thanks."
