The Stouffville entry followed Mayor Fran Sainsbury's ceremonial first pitch Friday evening by outlasting Oak Ridges 12-10.

Amanda Leger and Julia Peters swatted back to back home runs in the fourth inning to spark the offence, while Denise Neale struck out eight for Stouffville in the four inning game.

After falling to Thornhill 21-2 on Saturday morning, the Stouffville outfit regrouped, earning a 10-6 victory over Port Colborne. Juliana Kerswill's bases loaded double in the third frame was the big blow.

Stouffville won the game with four runs in the final inning, with Denise Neale picking up her second win of the tourney with a seven strikeout performance.

Stouffville coach and tournament organizer Dan Neale felt the competition was huge success. "I think we did Stouffville proud. All the comments from the seven visiting teams were very positive, and there were good special activities for the kids like the Road Runner contest."

Neale was presented with a pair of old undershorts, signed by each player, along with the words, "The team realized we came up a little short."

Till then scored on a sacrifice fly.

But when Betz pitcher Darryl Moxley led off the sixth with a single, assistant coach Wayne Allen was sent in to run for Moxley.

Gary Grant then reached base on an error, and Chris Jones singled, setting the stage for Joslin's game winner.

Moxley fired a six hitter, whiffing eight, to pick up the win.

On the road, Moxley fired a four hitter and Joslin had another big night at the plate as Betz defeated Bradford 6-2 on Tuesday. Joslin had two hits and two runs batted in, while Jones chipped in with a double and a single.

On Thursday in Port Perry, Steve Schell's RBI single in the top of the seventh capped a five run rally, enabling Betz to steal a 6-5 win.
