The win gave Stouffville a two-game sweep in the Provincial Elimination series, qualifying them for the All-Ontario championship tournament in Napanee Aug. 25-27.

"It had been a rough season," admitted Pongraz after the game. "But things are coming together. I started to get my control back. I'm glad it is coming together before the All-Ontario."

The Herb's Upholstering-N.S. Smith (Liz Fraser) Real Estate Bants have been struggling this season, but manager Gary Fraser says his team's recent surge, which has seen the club take its last four games, has put them in the position to challenge for the provincial title.

"The boys are starting to concentrate more. I feel confident about the All-Ontarios. We'll need good hitting and pitching, but none of the

teams are really strong, so it will be a matter of whoever wants to win it most."

The Bantams put Wednesday's game away with a four-run sixth inning.

Bill Pride and Pongraz led off with singles. Eilert Fraser walked and then David Caramanico cashed Pride with a safety.

Kevin Nicholls' sacrifice bunt scored Pongraz, then Fraser and Caramanico scampered home on wild pitched to complete the rally. Stouffville captured the first game of the set by a 10-8 score Tuesday in East Gwillimbury.

Leading 9-2 going into the sixth frame, the Bantams gave up six runs to make it a nervous finish.


Consecutive triples by Pride and Jason Cowan keyed a five run first inning to get Stouffville off to a fast start.

Nicholls went three for four, scoring two times, and Matthew McKnight had two RBIs to further the offensive cause.

Caramanico made a strong contribution from his catcher's position, serving to steady pitchers Pongraz and Jodi Infurnari.

The Bantams get back to league action this week, closing out their home schedule with a game against Newmarket tonight, at the Town Park, Diamond Two.



And if Whitchurch-Stouffville Soccer Association President and Kinsmen assistant coach Bob Tilley has his way, it will be the beginning of a grand tradition.

"We want these to be the new Royals," says Tilley of the under 10 year old selects.

The Royals soccer outfit were brought along by Johannessen from the under 10 level right up to late teens, winning several York Region titles along the way. They disbanded last fall.

Kinsmen head coach Joe Caldeira was pleased with his club's first outing against the Port Perry select team two weeks ago. Stouffville lost 2-1.

"We were quite happy. We had a few chances."

Stouffville's goal was scored by Frank Fisco, after some quick passing by the Kinsmen forward line.

Todd Juriansz on defence, Michael Owen on right wing, and Brian Gillespie at centre received high praise from the Stouffville coaching staff after the game.

"All the players are from our house league," says Caldeira. "If it works out well, then we'll put them in a league next year. We might try to put together a tournament with other York Region select teams later this season. We don't expect miracles the first year, though."

The select team concept is a realization of Tilley's pre-season goal to reestablish the select

team concept with the breaking up of the Royals.

"The opportunity was there," says Tilley. "There are nearly 70 kids in the under 10 level in our organization. There were 18-20 kids interested in trying out for the team. We had to have something for the kids to shoot for."

other assistant coach, is impressed with the desire of the players.

Rumeo, a first-year Stouffville resident, coached an under 18 team last year in an Italian soccer league in Toronto.

Tilley feels his game plan for the select team is right on track. "Our objective this year was to pick 20 kids, and put them into a half dozen games or so against other under 10 rep teams in the area. Then, we'll go with an under 11 team next year."

The team includes the sons of all three coaches. Goalie Robbie

Tilley is hoping to benefit from the tutelage of his father, who played goal years ago for the Brighton Boys soccer team in England.

All three coaches are self-professed soccer enthusiasts, and will conduct indoor practices this winter to prepare the team for its first season of league play in 1990.

"We hope this team will be together for a long time," says Tilley.
