


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# Israel a place of fascination

While there are many exotic destinations I've dreamed of visiting over the years, I confess Jerusalem was not, until recently, among them.

When we heard my husband's company was holding its annual directors' seminar there, and that we'd been invited to attend, our feelings ranged from

delighted disbelief and awe to a certain trepidation.

It was hard to ignore the fact that this country has endured a history of violence and instability; we couldn't help wondering what we were letting ourselves in for.

Nevertheless, our excitement increased as our departure approached and we spent much time gathering information about our destination. No amount of reading and research, however, could capture the magical experience of seeing first hand the ancient and holy land of Israel.

Tragedy has dogged the Jewish people for thousands of years; we visited the fortress of Masada, where 960 Jews perished by their own hand rather than surrender to the tyranny of the Romans.

The memorial of Yad Vashem, which painstakingly chronicles the horror and pathos of the Holocaust, provided a grim and deeply affecting reminder of man's continuing inhumanity to man.

Our tour of the old city included a visit to the Church of the Holy Sepulchre, the site of Christ's crucifixion and burial; an ancient and beautiful place whose charms are tempered by constant bickering between the various religious groups over their claims to individual areas within it.

Driving along the West Bank, through the Judean Hills and Jericho, and across miles of rocky, desolate desert, we encountered scattered groups of Bedouins, who somehow manage to survive despite the meagre vegetation and lack of water.

We floated on the salty water of the Dead Sea, took a cruise on the Sea of Galilee (actually a very modest-sized lake) and visited the archeological site of Bet She'an, which dates back to pre-Roman times.

We were also treated to a whirl of social events, including an unforgettable evening at the Bolshoi Ballet which, as a result of Glasnost, was appearing in Israel for the first time.

Throughout our stay, we had the good fortune to enjoy the services of Israeli tour guide Ron Perry, whose incredible

knowledge of his country and wonderful sense of humor helped make our visit especially memorable.

On one occasion, we drove through a flimsy-looking roadblock on our way to Galilee. "What's that for, Ron?" asked a member of the party. "That's to stop people bringing ham sandwiches into Jerusalem," came the deadpan reply.




On our bus ride out to the tarmac where the plane awaited us, we were accompanied by a tank, which didn't leave the runway until we had begun our ascent.
