SDSS Seniors beaten by tough Tiger team in exhibition action

Stouffville District Secondary School (SDSS) Senior Spartans boys basketball team coach Jim Fletcher played the role of strategist and philanthropist after his team was pounded 71-38 by the Uxbridge Secondary School (USS) Tigers in an exhibition game at the SDSS gym Thursday.

The Spartans led the contest 15-9 after the opening quarter, but then succumbed to a relentless Tiger attack that saw them score 26 points in the second quarter to take a commanding 35-21 lead.

Fletcher said that his Spartans, who are currently riding a five game winning streak in York Region league play, were holding back a little in the contest.

"We might have to play them (USS) in the DYSSA (Durham-York) high school championship tournament, so we didn't play all our cards," he said.

Fletcher also pointed out that his team ran into foul trouble early in the game, which forced him to bench aces Karam Amer and Travis White for a considerable part of the game.

But the Spartans' coach had nothing but praise for the USS Tigers.

"They earned the win. They are a well disciplined, well-coached team. They'll be in there when it comes time to contest the Durham title."

Kevin Harmer had 12 points to lead the Spartans offence, while Amer added 11.

The Spartans were to play at home against Langstaff yesterday before taking a two week exam break.

Junior Spartans destroy Denison in hoops win

In a game that was more like target practice than a basketball, the Stouffville District Secondary School (SDSS) Junior Spartans trounced Denison 72-20 in the school gym last Thursday.

The Spartans, who had been winless at home prior to the game, extended their record to two wins and a loss in the second half of the schedule, after going zero for six before the Christmas break.

Brian Leoni led the Spartans attack, hooping 23 points. Jason Hollin had 14 points, while Bill Pride, Dan Wilson, Jon Cowley, and Mike Greathead chipped in with 12, 11, six and five points respectively.

The Spartans dominated from the outset, taking the majority of the rebounds, and repeatedly making steals that led to fast

breaks.

But the Spartans went down to defeat, along with their Midget counterparts, when they travelled to Uxbridge Secondary School last Tuesday to take part in an exhibition double header.

The Junior SDSS cagers fell 54-45, while the Midgets lost 37-25.

The Juniors trailed 29-20 at half time, but managed to match the Uxbridge squad point in the last half of the game.

Greathead was top point getter for the Spartans, with 17. Wilson had 8 points.

The Midgets were ahead 15-12 at the half in their contest, then extended the bulge to 22-18 at one point in the second half, before Uxbridge took the game away from them.

Mike Knapp was the standout for the Spartans.

Bantam Clippers lose to Uxbridge as 'newspaper feud' heats up

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The Stouffville Edwards-Murphy Decorating Bantam Clippers have lost the latest round of what has become a newspaper feud between the Clippers and the Uxbridge Williamson's Generals Bantam squad.

The Clippers, on the heels of their first win of the season over Uxbridge two weeks earlier, were blanked 8-0 by the Generals in the opening game of their playoff round-robin in

Uxbridge Sunday afternoon.

Clippers' coach Joe Infurnari had taken exception to an early season report in an Uxbridge newspaper after a one-sided loss to the Generals.

He had used the article to inspire his troops in both their final showing at an Uxbridge tournament in December, when they were edged out by the Generals, and in their win over Uxbridge a week later.

After Sunday's loss to Uxbridge, Clipper's manager Wes Wilson said there was a conver-

sation between himself and the General's coach regarding the press war.

"It's not a big thing, but everyone's definitely aware of it," said Wilson.

The Clippers managed to stay in Sunday's game until the third period, when the Generals started adding to their 2-0 lead.

Stouffville was also forced to play two men short for five minutes in the brawl-filled second stanza, which Wilson said tired them out.
