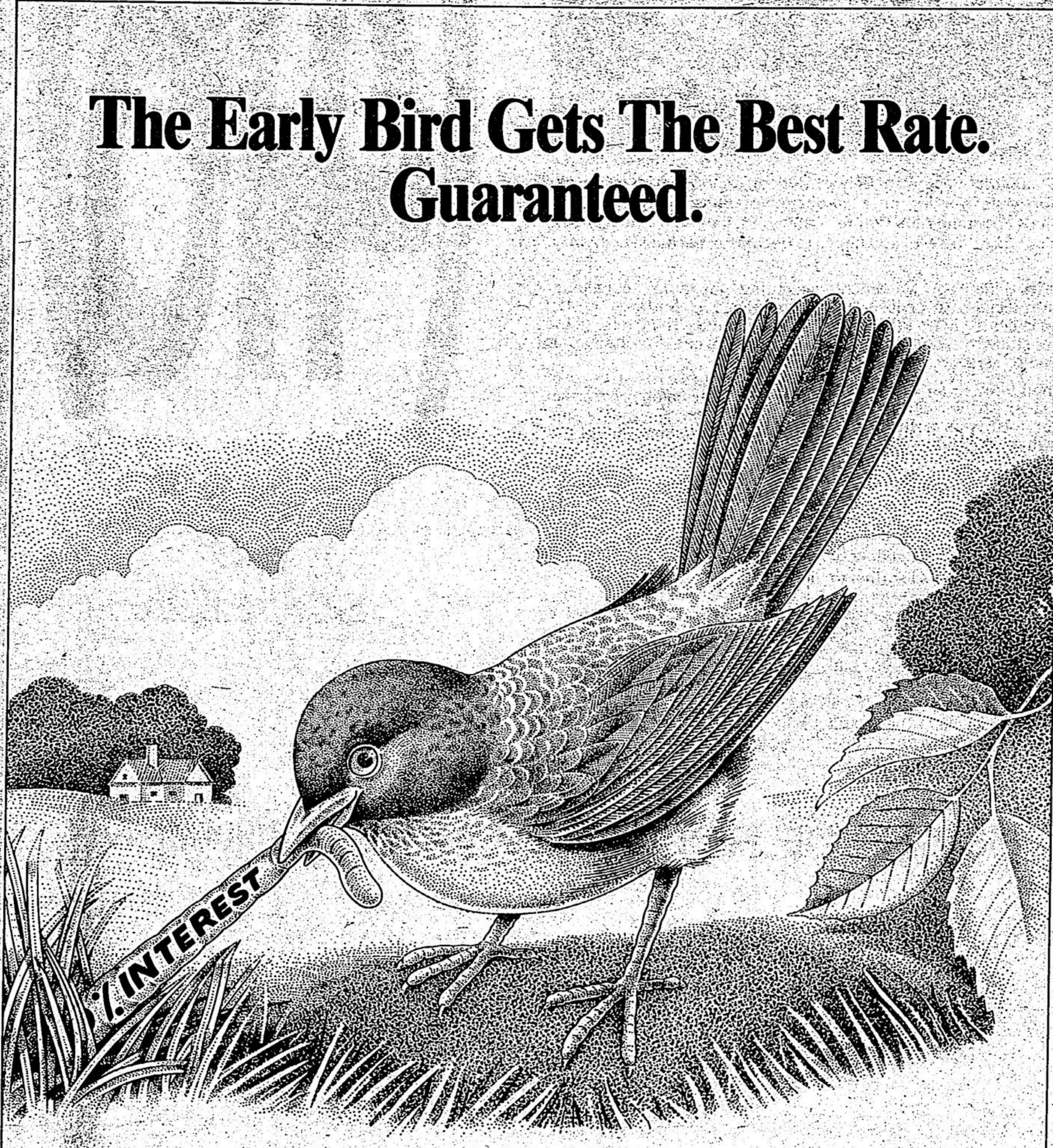
It was a present from the boys in the community.

Cattle ailment is eradicated

The Brucellosis Act has been repealed. A bill to repeal the Act received Royal Assent on Dec. 6, 1989.

Brucellosis is a bacterial disease of cattle, which causes abortion and high infertility in cattle. Through a federal-provincial program of vaccinations and testing, the once prevalent and costly disease has been eradicated.

Since Ontario has been brucellosis-free since 1985, the Brucellosis Act is no longer required.
