Local environmentalists form Sierra Club

The four original directors of Lake Musselman Club, which was instrumental in persuading the government to undertake an environmental study on the lake's water quality, have won approval from the Sierra Club of Eastern Canada to form a local chapter. The international organization, whose headquarters are in San Francisco, was founded in 1892 and boasts a total membership of over 500,000 people committed to fighting environmental pollution.

The area covered by the new chapter has yet to be decided, "but it could be quite vast," predicts local director Ken Jobe. "We've extended an invitation to every environmental group we know in the area and they're all thrilled, because they're able to join the club, but still maintain their own name and identity, and work as a committee within the club." The four local directors are: K.E. Jobe, B.E. Palmer, B.E. Norton and P. Weber.

Members will receive a magazine six times a year and a newsletter from the Canadian chapter five times a year, and can participate in many activities including skating, hiking and various outings. The date of the founding meeting of the Sierra Club will be announced when the Lake Musselman Environmental Study is released in about a month's time. "The bar instructor told her to go ahead and enter, even though she'd never done it before. She went by the recipe and took her time measuring everything carefully; she was so surprised when she won," explains Hans. Heidi will now go on to represent Canada in the Young Bartender World Competition in Lisbon, Portugal. "She's leaving on July 1st, flying to Germany and Italy and then on to Portugal."

Memorial award

The York Region Board of Education has recommended acceptance of the Fred Crossen Memorial Award for students in five area schools. Mr. Crossen passed away in September of 1988 at the age of 88 years, and his wife Eleanor applied to the board for approval of the annual presentation, which would recognize citizenship and community involvement for a student who would not otherwise win an award. "Fred was always interested in doing something like this," noted Mrs. Crossen. "He used to mention it, and

we never did get it done, but he was good about helping people out. After he passed away, I thought it would be nice to do something along those lines."

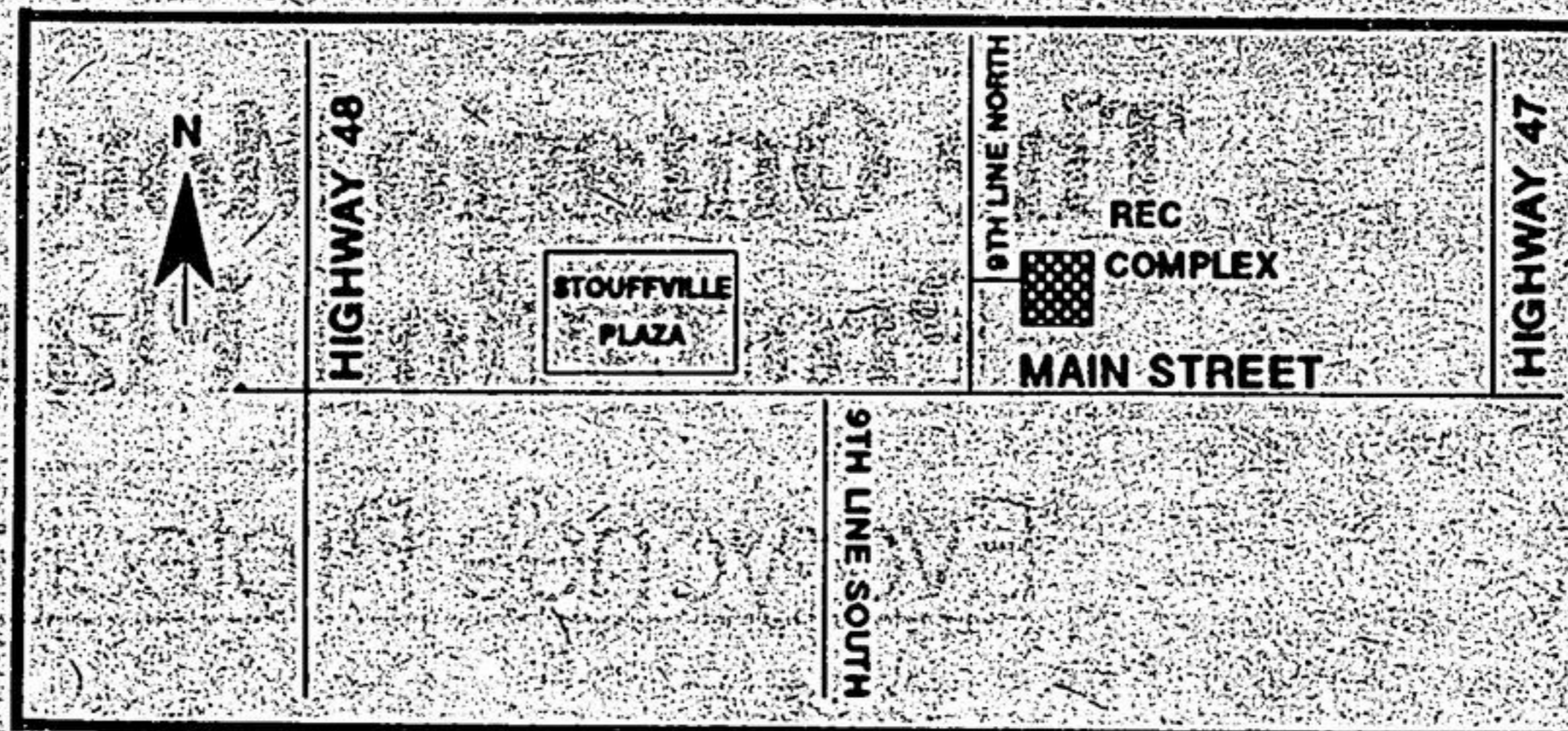
