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Safe at second



## Candidates vowed to team up against Scarpitti

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Two candidates for the provincial Liberal nomination agreed to cooperate in an effort to stop the third candidate from winning.

Michael Kusner, a candidate and a professor at Ryerson Polytechnical Institute, said he and Whitchurch Stouffville Mayor Fran Sainsbury pledged to support each other if either of them had to leave

the race. By combining their support they hoped to defeat the eventual winner, Regional Councillor Frank Scarpitti.

The candidates could have fulfilled their pledge if the first round of voting in Thursday's nomination meeting had been inconclusive.

If neither of the candidates had gained more than 50 percent of the votes, a second round of voting would have been held with the two

leading candidates running. The candidate that received the least votes in the first round would have had to withdraw.

Mr. Kusner said according to the agreement, if he had to withdraw, he would have asked his supporters to vote for Mayor Sainsbury. If she had to drop out, she would have done the same for Mr. Kusner.

However, the two could not fulfill their agreement because Mr. Scarpitti won the majority of votes

in the first round.

Mr. Kusner said he opposed Mr. Scarpitti because he entered the

party only shortly before he announced his intentions to run.
