"Everything went very smoothly," Kevin's mother June told The Tribune.

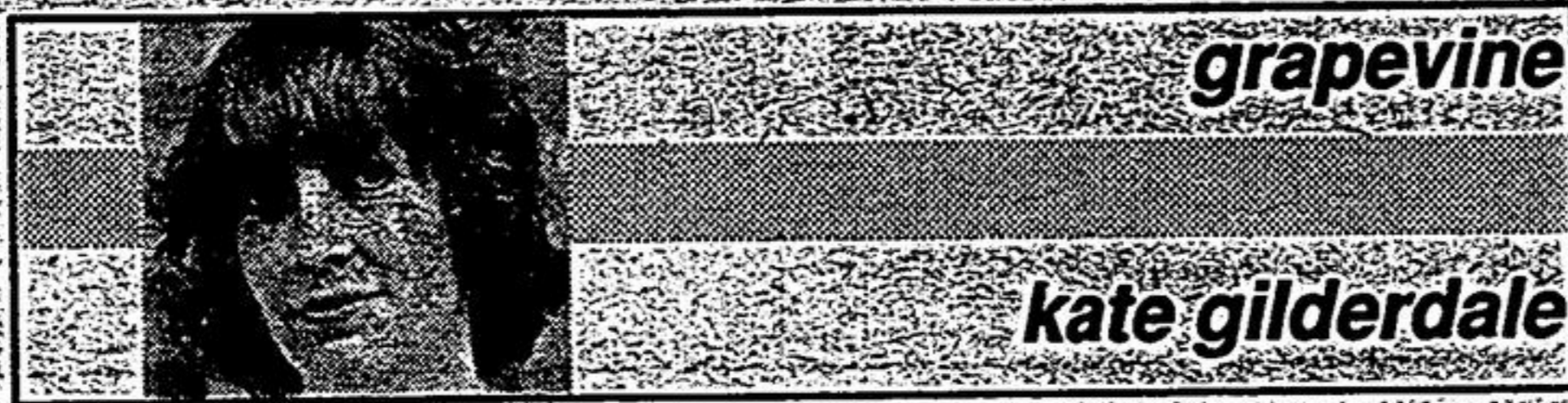
"After the ceremony, we went back to Kellington's for a family meal and on to the Legion for a dance."

Her husband Adrian, himself a tennis pro, explains, "She completed a season of tournaments and has only lost one match since the beginning of the year. She was ranked number one nationally and provincially in singles and doubles."

Both Sally and Adrian hope her success will convince people that athletic life doesn't end at 20.

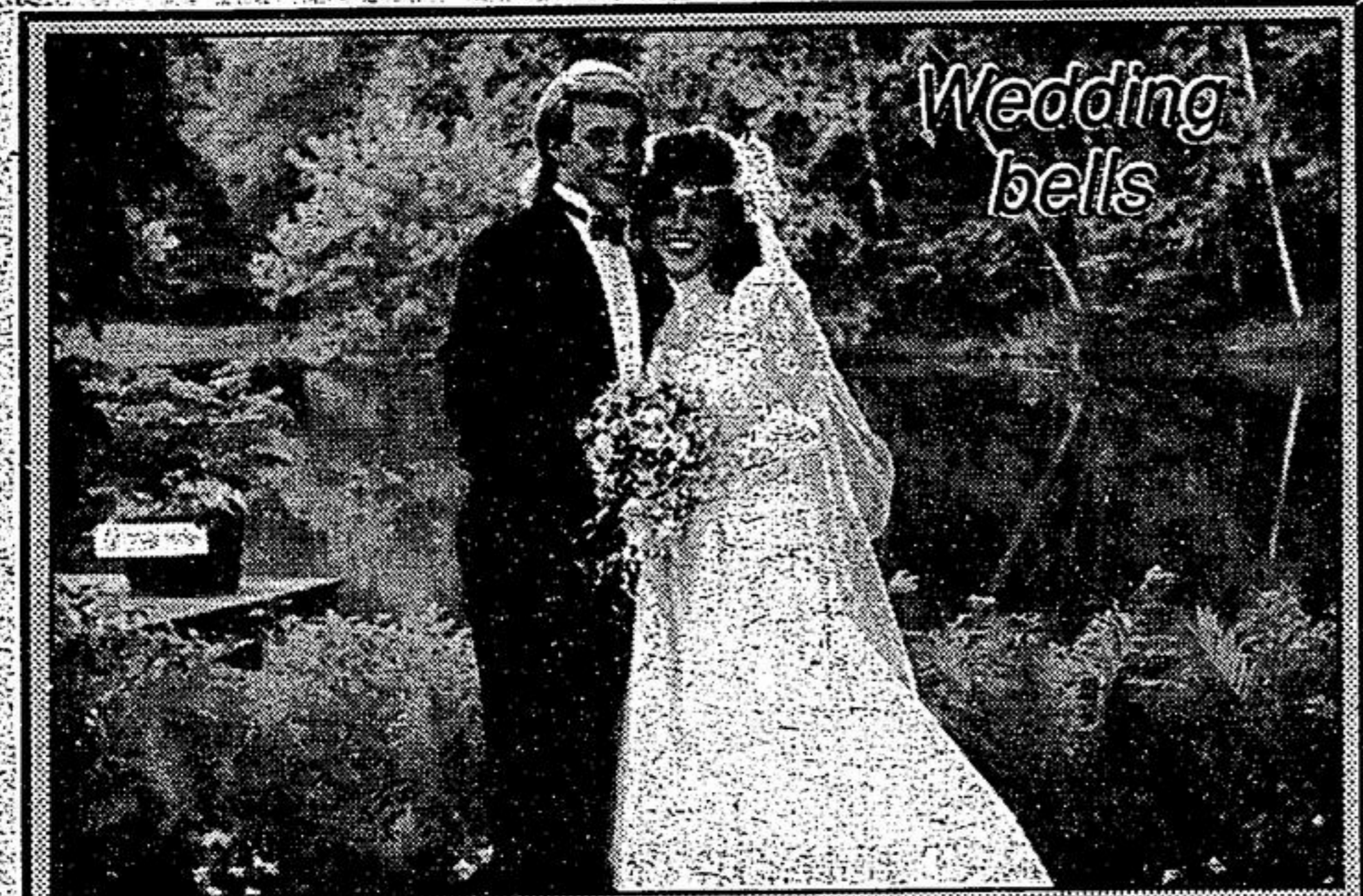
On the outward journey, they flew to Calgary and then took a smaller plane to Kelowna.

### FORM 1 PLANNING ACT, 1983 NOTICE OF THE PASSING OF A ZONING BY-LAW BY THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF WHITCHURCH-STOUFFVILLE

TAKE NOTICE that the Council of The Corporation of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville passed By-law 90-134 on the 11th day of September, 1990 under Section 34 of the Planning Act, 1983.

AND TAKE NOTICE that any person or agency may appeal to the Ontario Municipal Board in respect of the by-law by filing with the Deputy Clerk of The Corporation of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville not later than the 9TH day of OCTOBER, 1990 a notice of appeal setting out the objection to the by-law and the reasons in support of the objection.

An explanation of the purpose and effect of the by-law, describing the lands to which the by-law applies, is below. As the By-law applies to any development where the Parking Area Regulations are applicable, no key map is available. The complete by-law is available for inspection in my office during regular office hours. DATED at the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville this 19th day of September, 1990.

### EXPLANATORY NOTE BY-LAW NUMBER 90-134

The Amendment, being an amendment to the general provisions of General Zoning By-law No. 87-34, applies to any development where the Parking Area Regulations are applicable.

The purpose of the Amendment is to modify the parking area regulations by changing the standards for the provision of designated parking spaces for physically disabled persons. The Amendment requires a minimum of 1 designated parking space for 20 to 99 automobile parking spaces, and 1 additional designated space for each additional 100 automobile spaces or part thereof.

In addition, the Amendment provides increased standards for hospitals, medical centres, clinics, and senior citizens' homes at the rate of approximately 1 designated parking for each 30 automobile parking spaces.

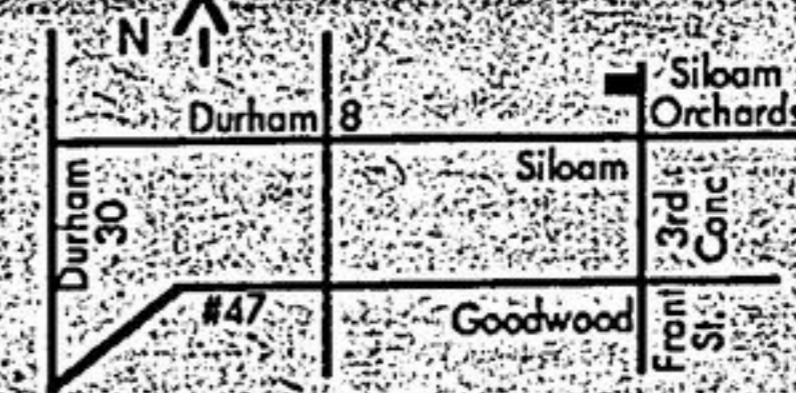
