

New pastor at Stouffville Pentecostal

Church welcomes new Pastor Rev. Gene Clark moved to Stouffville from St. John's, Nfld. at the beginning of August, to take up his duties as pastor of Stouffville Pentecostal Church.

Originally from St. John's, he was a pastor there for eight years and prior to that he was in Montreal for five years. Rev. Clark brings with him his wife Donna and sons Jeffrey, 10, Bradley, 9 and Daniel, 5. "I just love this area," Rev. Clark said. "It's quite different from what I was used to in St. John's; the pace of life is quieter, and yet you've got all the amenities and a big city within easy reach."
